


GETTING READY FOR GOD'S NEW THING... Anne Miller



As I write this, I'm very aware that my time at Knox as worship leader is coming to a close. It has been a privilege to journey with you since February 2020. None of us anticipated that five weeks in we would have to shut down public worship. What resulted were quick adjustments, lots of logistics and the need for much flexibility. I'm so grateful to Nancy, Janet and George for making it all possible week to week, and to all of our readers and musicians and, most recently, ushers and greeters. It has been a joy to serve with you in this strange time.

I'm also aware of wonderful bonds I've made with many of you through great things happening and tough times you've experienced and just the struggles of the pandemic. I don't take what you've shared with me lightly and I'm grateful for the trust placed in me. You have blessed me in many ways and inspired me with your faith and vulnerability. We have incredible and resilient people in this family. Thanks to those who do so much for pastoral care – the prayer link, prayer shawl group, newsletter deliverers and others who carry out this vital ministry.

Knox will always be my home. I will be very carefully discerning what role, if any, is helpful and appropriate for me as our new minister of Word and Sacrament begins here in November. It is a time of transition and excitement for us as a congregation. I want to clear the way for whatever God asks him to do here. Rev. Dr. Kim brings a wealth of experience and many gifts which our Search Team recognized were needed. By the time you read this, his Call should have been passed by our Presbytery and will then move on to his current Presbytery.

There is so much possibility ahead of us. Rev. Kim has answered the Call to come here and will develop a renewed vision with us. I look forward to talking to him about how I can best support his ministry and his adjustment to life in Woodstock and at Knox. I'm excited for what he brings to us and what God may call me to next in ministry wherever that may be. It will be a new chapter for Knox and I'm so grateful to the Search Team for their faithfulness in the process under challenging circumstances. Thanks also to the Rev. Al Brouwer for steering the team and Session during the vacancy and trusting in me to lead worship and do pastoral care.

I would also like to remind you of something startling: Rev. Kim will not be like me. He probably will not write mid-week reflection e-mails, something I did specifically because of the pandemic. He may not sing a solo or call as regularly as I have because his role and tasks and responsibilities are different. He likely will not lead worship in the same way as me. And that's okay. Things will change to match his skills and what God gives him to share with us.

He also will not be like Rev. Mark or Rev. John or Rev. Ann or Rev. Glenn or Rev. Jan. He will be the gifted person God made him to be and will have different strengths and interests. As we will hear in the book of Esther, just like she was placed in a situation 'for such a time as this' I believe that Rev. Kim has come to us by God's guidance for this time – a time of growing diversity in Woodstock, a time where we need to be listening more intently for God's direction as the pandemic continues, a time to hear anew what our ministry is to the wider community and how we can creatively grow our family of faith.

Rev. Kim *will* be like me and previous ministers in that he loves Jesus and he will strive to faithfully serve God and the people here. He will leave his home and move to be with us and is

bringing his lovely wife Kyoungmi. It is our job to welcome them and to help them feel at home and part of the family. It will take time for him to get to know us, especially due to the pandemic. We will need to offer patience and compassion as he adjusts to a new place of ministry where he knows just a handful of us, and even those hardly at all.

This October, Rev. Kim will be preparing for this huge change in his life. He is stepping out in faith, trusting that God has led him here. And we have work to do as well. If you are at all unsettled about him coming, especially in this pandemic, I hope that you will be in prayer about it, trusting in God's goodness and faithfulness. We all should be praying as we prepare for our ministry relationship to begin with him and his wife, asking God's leading for them and for us as a congregation and that we would honour the gift that we are to each other.

We should remember that while he is bringing many gifts to us, we come offering many gifts ourselves. As a congregation we have weathered this difficult time with healthy finances, many projects undertaken and completed, and many ministries intact. We offer lots of volunteers with so many different gifts. We have a beautiful building, terrific staff, and a variety of people of many ages who are faithful and seeking, those who have been around for decades and those who are more recent members who bring outside perspective and experiences of other churches.

This is an exciting time. Let's prepare ourselves for what is to come. Let's be enthusiastic and optimistic. Let's pray and ask God to bless this new beginning. Because God still has much to do through us at Knox, 'for such a time as this'.

Ministry Reports

Mission

- <u>Knox Kids' Camp</u> It ran for six weeks this summer. Attendance varied between 8 and 12 campers. In all 31 children took part from 17 different families. There were 7 children from Knox, 17 children from other churches and seven children with no church home.
- <u>Supplies 4 Students</u> Over the summer congregation members were invited to send monetary donations to the United Way Oxford for the Supplies 4 Students program.
- <u>PWS&D</u> Donations to PWS&D were encouraged for relief work in Haiti after their devastating floods.
- Canadian Bible Society The CBS is discontinuing the Baptism Bibles Program.

Considering Pre-Authorized Remittance?

We at Knox have had a pre-authorized remittance plan (PAR) in place for years, however very few of our members have taken advantage of this system to give their gifts to our ministry. There are many benefits to the PAR plan:

- Your contributions will be made regularly even if you are away on business or vacation.
- You will not have to write a cheque or carry cash to church each week.
- The church will receive your contributions consistently, which will help pay all the bills even in the summer months when many are away.
- It will save time and work for those who count and register the offerings each Sunday.
- Avoids "catch up periods".
- You can budget your monthly giving.
- Regular support of your church in the amount that you choose.
- Best of all, never again will you have the frustration of getting halfway to church and then remembering that you forgot your offering.

How the plan works:

- You sign up for the plan and indicate the amount you wish to give for work at our Church, Presbyterians Sharing, PWS&D or other Ministries.
- The plan can be changed as you wish at any time by notifying Nancy in the office.
- Cards are available to place in the offering plate each week.

Registration pamphlets are available on tables as you enter the sanctuary; please take one and consider this as a way of sharing your blessings. If you have any questions on the plan you can contact Steve McInnis or Nancy in the church office.

Something New at Knox... Nora Martin



This Fall, we are starting something new at Knox. I mean, other than getting a new minister! I mean a guided meditation group. What is that, you ask? Let me explain.

In the Spring of 2020 while Steve and I were in Toronto upon our return from Malawi, I started attending a guided meditation group on Zoom led by the interim minister at Leaside Presbyterian Church which we were both attending (on Zoom) before returning to Woodstock. At first I found that the twenty minutes of sitting still and quiet were a stretch for me. I kept feeling as if I should have my knitting in my hands! However, there was something about it that kept me coming back every week to join the guided meditation sessions. Before I knew what was happening, I was so hooked that I kept on attending even after returning to Woodstock. Then in December of 2020 a series of events led to me taking over the leadership of the group, and I've been leading the group every Wednesday since January 6, 2021.

I still haven't really explained what guided meditation is. Essentially the participants in the group sit still and quiet, with their eyes closed, for the full period of time, usually twenty minutes, while the leader makes periodic comments, encouraging and directing them to help them stay focussed on whatever they've chosen as their focus for that period of time. The goal is spiritual transformation, which is really a gift from God but one which we can cultivate through meditation (among other spiritual practices).

Why would anyone want to engage in meditation, let alone guided meditation? I can

assure you that for me it has been immeasurably enriching for my spiritual life, and for everyday life (which are, of course, one and the same thing in the end). In an email she sent today, my meditation teacher says the following:

As we sit in stillness together and bring a little quiet to our minds and bodies, we discover that the worries of this world start to make less noise. As the worries of this world make less noise, we begin to hear better the still small voice in our hearts that speaks to us of love, peace and joy. The more often we come to stillness (even for brief moments), the easier it becomes to hear our hearts.

These sentences eloquently explain what I believe about meditation. They explain why I keep on with it personally every day, and why I join her group every Monday, and why I want so badly to start a group here at Knox. I believe that anyone can and would benefit from engaging in meditation, and I know that I, at least, have found participating in guided meditation is a good way to start. It's also an encouragement to continue even when one has established a personal meditation practice.

When I lead guided meditation, I usually start by sharing a verse or two from the Bible for the people to focus on for the duration of the meditation, something that will allow them to focus their minds and sit in stillness for twenty minutes. There is nothing magic about twenty minutes, but it's considered to be the usual time for meditation, at a minimum.

If all this sounds like something you'd like to try out, please contact me, either through email (<u>stevenora331@gmail.com</u>) or by phone (519-536-0789) as soon as possible. I'd like to start in October sometime, either in person or on Zoom (or possibly both), depending on the desire of those who express interest. I'm flexible as to time of day, but if it's evening, I'd prefer Mondays. We'd meet weekly, but if you find coming every week is too much for your schedule, no one is taking attendance!



This popular song is reflective and personal, though it is to be sung






