Rev. Dr. Dong-Ha Kim, Minister of Word and Sacrament

I fondly remember a lecture that was once given to a group of lay students at Knox College. My supervisor in studies was lecturing on the meditative practices of the Medieval Monks; I was assisting him on that occasion. Evidently, scholars have learned that even during what would be considered mundane practices, like gardening and cooking, those Monks were offering prayers of Thanksgiving to their Creator, Provider, and Sustainer! Put another way, these Medieval Monks looked upon any and every task as means and opportunity to praise God.

Fascinating piece of church history aside, for me, this bit of church history speaks volumes about our understanding of 'worship' as Christians. As a new minister commencing work at Knox Presbyterian Church, Woodstock, I wish to share, first and foremost, my passion for worshiping God, not just on Sundays but in every aspect of our collective faith journey.

Attending and leading committees are but some of the duties before me. As we speak, I've had the great pleasure of participating in several such meetings. The conveners of each respective committee have been most gracious in extending invitations. Being no stranger to committees and their respective meetings in my previous line of work, I understand the importance of such for an organization like the church. Being a clergy person, I am no stranger to seeing committee meetings unfold in a prayerful manner. And I did witness that, amply, here at Knox Presbyterian Church, Woodstock.

I do see each gathering and event unfolding within and in the name of Knox Presbyterian Church as something we do to worship God. If the ethos behind Medieval Monks worshiping God through each chopping action of meal preparations has anything to teach us, I believe it is precisely this, *that we worship and glorify God in and through all that we do and speak!* On that note, no event, action, or word can be spared from this noble task.

I like to believe that it is as a result of such understanding that activities/tasks we undertake at the church are put to such scrutiny and diligence; for we take to heart our Lord's commandment:

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength... [and] love your neighbor as yourself." (Mark 12:30-31, NIV).

As we approach the Season of Advent, I pray that each of us will encounter the immeasurable love of our Triune God, one who first demonstrated the meaning of this commandment by sending His Son for our sake.

We met in person with 11 elders present. The Rev. Dr. Dong-Ha Kim was welcomed as our new moderator.

There was correspondence from: General Assembly; Evangel Hall Mission; Southgate Centre – thanking us for the donation from the Isabel Johnson funds; Ross MacDonald - thanking us for the donation to Presbyterian Connections; and John Ault - requesting the dismissal of the search committee. Session decided that the search committee be dissolved and the members be thanked in worship.

Ministry Reports

Leading With Care

- <u>Police checks</u> for staff and volunteers are being monitored to make sure they are current.
- <u>Staff vaccination for COVID-19</u> it has been checked that all have received two doses.
- <u>Fire Safety</u> New members of staff have been trained. There has been a delay in holding a fire drill due to COVID-19.

Mission

- <u>Knox Kids Camp 2021</u> Financial 2021 Income of \$8,215 and expenses of \$25,343. This gives a deficit of \$17,128. We budgeted \$10,000, leaving \$7,128 which we will ask the Trustees to cover. Knox Kids Camp Mission Project money will go to Evangel Hall \$158.65.
- <u>KAOS</u> Has resumed meetings Friday evenings, 7-9:00 pm, for ages 10-17. Terry Weatherbee has retired as a Youth leader.
- <u>Canadian Bible Society, Woodstock Branch</u> On September 27, 2021, members of the Woodstock Branch of the CBS decided to disband. Used stamps will still be collected. Elaine Stevens will put CBS info in the Knox News periodically and invite donations.
- <u>Adelaide Soup Bowl</u> has been inactive since March 2020 and the feeling is that it should remain so until January 2022 to see where the virus is going.
- <u>Coats for Kids & Adults</u> Knox will support this initiative again this year.
- <u>The Christmas Place</u> Cash donations are invited for the purchase of gift cards.
- The <u>"Gifts of Change"</u> booklet will be promoted in December.

Board of Stewards

- <u>The new secretary</u> is Kim Kenny.
- <u>All of the locks</u> on the outside doors will be changed.

Covid Update... Anne Miller



It is so wonderful to see more of you at worship and to be able to lift our voices together in song! And it is wonderful that our worship leaders at the front can now be unmasked as long as they are behind the plexiglass and also more than six feet away from anyone else. These changes to Public Health guidelines were a great way to welcome Rev. Kim among us.

As I write this, we appear to be in another wave of the pandemic in our area. Also as I write this, I note that we have had no known cases of Covid within our worshiping congregation. Following the guidelines and protocols from Public Health has been working. We just need to keep on doing the things we know that we should do – pre-screening for Covid before coming to the church, wearing a mask, sanitizing or thoroughly washing our hands, and physically distancing. That last one is the hardest for many of us, but it is important.

The question has been asked as to whether we will require proof of full vaccination to attend worship. At our meeting November 17th we discussed this at length as a team and have decided that we will not go this route for a few reasons. Unless mandated by Public Health, we will welcome everyone to worship who follows the above protocols because:

- 1. the protocols are working
- 2. it is God's house and all are welcome we don't want to turn away anyone seeking to worship
- 3. we recognize that some people cannot be vaccinated for health reasons
- 4. everyone having to be fully vaccinated could give us a false sense of security and tempt us to loosen protocols, but we can still have Covid in a milder form and pass it on to others

Thank you once again to our faithful greeters and ushers, and to everyone who is doing what they can to keep all of us safe in the building. We show our care for each other by following the guidelines, even if it means we don't get to sit where we would choose for the sake of someone else's safety or comfort. We show our care for each other by completing the sign-in log through the week, distancing from staff and others in the building, and sanitizing washrooms after use with a wipe. These may seem strange ways of loving our neighbour, but they truly matter.

A few updates from our latest meeting:

We will continue to monitor the pandemic's impact and all public health and government updates. You will be kept informed if anything needs to change as we continue to journey through this time together.

With the pulpit now in the middle of the platform, we have opened up more seating in the balcony. If you choose to sit upstairs to free up more room on the main floor, please sit in a pew with a pink postit sticker. Bibles and hymnbooks are at these spots and they are distanced from the other seats.

If you arrive to worship late, come in at the ramp door and someone will assist you. The parking lot and Hunter Street doors are locked when worship begins.

Blessings to you and yours at Advent and Christmas. May you experience much joy and peace as you reflect on our Saviour's birth.

"Silent Night" is a well-loved Christmas song and there is a wonderful image on the front cover of the current "Today" devotional booklet. On December 10th, the writer Pastor Brian Kuyper, shares a beautiful reflection. Brian states that the last verse specifically, is like a birth announcement. "This is the greatest birth announcement ever. The baby born in Bethlehem has significance for the whole world. He is the Saviour, the one who saves us from our sins. He is the Messiah, the 'anointed one' promised through the prophets. And He is the Lord. God sent His Son, who is himself fully God, to become human and live among us."

Author and parish priest Franz Joseph Mohr wrote the beautiful words. The traditional version of the "Silent Night" story has mice eating through the cables of the church organ. The poor priest then had to come up with a Christmas Eve hymn that could be sung without the dilapidated old instrument. Mohr took a poem he had written to his friend Franz Gruber, and together they came up with a song that could be accompanied by a guitar.

Instead of the usual Latin hymns, "Silent Night" was sung in German, the language of Mohr's parishioners in Austria, December 1818. Since then it has been sung in at least forty-five languages!

At Knox Church, there continues to be transitions. Rev. Kim and his wife Kyoungmi are being welcomed into our midst. Anne Miller has been thanked for her devoted work as Interim Worship Leader. Nancy Wright will be retiring on December 17th of this year. Many changes in a short amount of time. Seasons Greetings from Knox Kitchen Crew!



This is the time of year to prepare for your Christmas feast. We thought you would like some tips and recipes.

To start prepping your turkey, let it soak in a salted water bath for half an hour. Pat dry with paper towel inside and out. Next, take softened butter or margarine and with your hand place it under the skin on the breast – this will help keep the turkey moist and brown the skin. Cook unstuffed bird at 350 degrees 13 minutes for every pound. Cook stuffed bird at 350 degrees 1/2 hr for every pound. Baste every 1/2 hr and when done let sit 15 minutes covered before cutting. Your vegetables such as turnip or squash can be made ahead an heated that day.

Now here is a recipe for an old favourite dessert which can be made ahead also.

Christmas Carrot Pudding and Sauce



Mix all together: 1 1/2 cups flour 1 cup sugar 1 cup suet 1 1/2 cups raisins 1 cup ground potato 1 cup ground carrots 1/2 cup mixed peel 1 tsp baking soda Mix together and steam for 3 hrs

Pudding Sauce

1 cup brown sugar 1/4 cup butter 1 tablespoon flour Mix together and brown over heat, add water until slightly thickened


