FROM THE MINISTER'S DESK



STRATEGIC PLANNING – 'BIBLICAL LESSONS'

We don't often think of Old Testaments Scriptures as prime sources of 'contemporary strategic planning.' I would like to say, however, that nothing could be farthest from the truth.

In one leg of his journey, God leads Joseph to the land of Egypt. There, using God-given gifts of wisdom and discernment, Joseph successfully interprets a set of perplexing dreams plaguing the Pharaoh. Subsequently, Joseph ends up working for the Pharaoh.

Joseph applies himself to do the work of strategic planning for the Pharaoh and his kingdom in light of his dreams. In short, during the seven years of abundant harvest, by the grace of God, by applying his God-given skill and wisdom, Joseph successfully brought Egypt through the agricultural catastrophe. When seven years of good harvests came, Joseph developed a stockpiling system to store the grain for use during the coming drought. When the seven years of drought arrived, Joseph opened the storehouses and provided enough food to bring the nation through the famine. His strategy and effective implementation of the plan allowed Egypt to supply grain not only to its people, but to other parts of the world.

It is a well-known fact that Knox Presbyterian Church, Woodstock, has been blessed with several sizable bequests from various estates, especially in recent years. On this note, a special congregational meeting was held on Sunday, May 15th, 2022 during the Service of Worship. For the most part, those gathered confirmed many of the discernments made a year ago, on how best we may express our worship of God through these gifts.

However way opinions were expressed, I believe we did so in the spirit of Joseph's wisdom in handling matters of gifts of abundance so that resources will continue to be available for times to come. While we are grateful for the commitment of our congregation members for their support of ministry at Knox, Woodstock, we do believe that such additional and bountiful gifts of bequests, if handled wisely, will ensure that this congregation not only survives current challenges, but will be around to meet new ones and flourish.

In short, we are hopeful that decisions made regarding current line of bequests will potentially touch lives for many generations to come. Like in Joseph's circumstance, we believe that God is able to accomplish abundantly far more than we can ask or imagine. And therein lies the foundation on which our congregational meeting stood.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

Congregational Meeting May 15 2022

The meeting was held to discuss the disposition of three estates, none of which had any conditions for Knox to follow.

A. Decisions for Isabel Johnson Estate. \$927,537.40

1. At the conclusion of year one, 10% of the estate had been transferred to the Mission Committee of the church for dispersal to worthy charities in Woodstock, the County and further afield. This completes the first decision.
2. The sum of \$200,000 was added to the Tower Capital Account to do more exterior restorations. This recommendation is complete, with the work to be carried out in 2022.
3. To add \$20,000 to the ramp repairs to replace the rusted railing to bring it up to code.
4. To add \$20,000 to the Organ/Piano Fund for future improvements.
5. Presbyterian Cemetery originally \$10,000, increased in the current motion to \$25,000.
6. Begin a children's' program starting in fall of 2023, \$10,000
7. Consideration and further discussion of investing in building condos or apartments adjacent to the church.
8. Investigate solar panels on roof. This motion was defeated.
9. Remove carpet and restore hardwood floors. This motion was withdrawn.
10. Invest the residual amount in the PCC or similar fund and/or GICs.

B. Decisions for Sondra Turner Estate. \$29,501.30

1. \$10k toward stained glass project. Stained glass from the former Chalmers United church will be installed in the Friendship Centre.
2. \$1,200 to replace the parking lot doors and replace the windows at the Hunter Street doors.
3. \$9,000 exterior lighting project.
4. \$3,000 sound and video upgrade in the sanctuary.
5. \$5,000 toward the children and youth music program, along with the \$10,000 mentioned in the Johnston estate above.
6. Balance \$1,301.50 to Missions.

C. Decisions for Audrey Steele Estate. \$1,000

Motion to use the full amount for the campership program.

SESSION NOTES

The Session held an in-person meeting on Wednesday, May 4th, 2022 @ 7pm. There were ten elders in attendance. The meeting opened with prayer and a reflection from Psalm 37:5, 1 John 5:14.

Correspondence: We received a retirement letter from June Masters, which was accepted with thanks for her many years of service to Knox.

Ministry Reports:

Christian Education Committee - Knox Kids' Summer camp plans are falling into place, including staffing, training, and programming.

Leading With Care – The fire drill plans will be revised to reflect the inaccessible access ramp.

Covid-19 – We have changed to have one greeter and one usher at each door and worshippers are not being ushered to their seats. The committee recommends starting a coffee hour once a month, possibly in September. The Foodgrains Bank is tentatively planning an after-church strawberry social on June 19th and the traditional pork barbecue in September. Knox is also planning a return to the monthly Sunday eat and greet breakfast in September. The Covid committee was asked to consider the removal of ropes from the sanctuary pews.

Mission – KAOS is meeting with a small regular attendance. The Kids' Camp leaders and the Knox KAOS staff are planning a retreat together at the Maple Grove Christian Retreat Centre near Thamesford at the beginning of July.

A new music ministry outreach project is being considered at Knox for the fall of 2023. It would offer free music lessons, mostly vocal, to children and youth, especially to under-privileged children and youth.

Knox will support Beginnings Family Services with loose offerings of coin and bills from Sunday offerings from May 8 to June 19.

Pastoral Care -- The committee continues to track the status of members of the congregation. The prayer shawl group and several meditation groups continue to meet.

Board of Stewards – The kitchen is back in service. The outside parking lot lighting is complete. Further lighting upgrades along Hunter and Riddell streets are in process, but may be expensive because of the need for upgrading wiring and posts.

Offerings are slightly lower than last year, but still good.

Restoration Committee -- External brickwork restoration continues. The construction site looks more organised than in previous years.

Worship – The regular collection of offering during the service started on Easter Sunday and will continue.

Trustees - There has been a good response for the Ukraine relief fund.

Presbytery/Synod Report -- Rev. Joel and Rev. David Sherbino will be visiting Malawi for 3 weeks.

The Raw Carrot has moved back to Paris Presbyterian Church.

Paris Commissioners to General Assembly have been selected, including Marg Douglas from Knox.

Roll Clerk - We have four districts with no elder oversight.

Ministers' Report - Rev. Kim appreciated his study leave after a busy Lent and Easter.

According to the traditional schedule, this year's Reformation Day service will be led by Knox and held at our church. Details, including COVID protocols, need to be considered.

New Business:

- A Congregational Meeting is planned for May 15 to discern the allocation of bequests.
- There are two baptism requests: Bryson Hardeman (3 yrs) and Elijah Smith (1 yr).

KITCHEN CREW RECIPE

“If Rosie Can Do It, You Can Do It” Bread



Preheat oven to 400 degrees

Ingredients

2 cups warm water
 1 tbsp dry active yeast
 2 1/2 tsp sugar
 5 cups all-purpose flour
 2 1/2 tsp salt
 1 tsp oil
 1 egg white (for egg wash)

In a small bowl combine warm water, sugar and yeast; set aside for 5 minutes, or until it foams.

In a large bowl or stand mixer add 2 cups flour and salt then pour in activated yeast water. Mix and continue adding flour, 1/2 a cup at a time, and knead until dough is smooth and not sticky. When this occurs, add oil and cover the entire ball of dough.

Cover bowl with a towel and let rest for 1 hour.

After dough has rested, turn dough onto a well-floured surface. Cut in half and set the other half aside. Roll the one ball into a rectangle. Now begin rolling the dough from the widest point, tuck in the ends when finished and pinch the seams together.

Flip over onto a parchment covered baking tray. Make 3 score marks on the top. Mix egg white with a little bit of water and brush on top. Continue with the other ball and do the same. Then rest for 1 hour, covered.

Once rested, bake in preheated oven for 17-23 min.

Here is some interesting background on a hymn which has been widely regarded as one of the best "ecology hymns." Its title is "Thank You, God, for Water, Soil and Air" and its text was written by Brian Wren in September 1973 in Colchester, England.

This hymn was included in the British supplementary hymnal "New Church Praise" in 1975. It is not found in the Book of Praise, but Kim has kindly included the words. This text combines thankfulness with overt admission of our responsibility for ecological stewardship - so necessary in modern times.

Brian Wren was born in 1936 and he is a major figure in the revival of contemporary hymn writing. He studied French literature at New College and theology at Mansfield College in Oxford, England. Ordained in 1965, he was pastor of the Congregational Church. Wren now resides in the United States where he is active as a freelance lecturer, preacher, and full-time hymn writer. The Book of Praise includes twenty-two hymns written by him!

Kintail Camp

Kintail Camp is our Presbyterian Church's camp. It is located near Goderich off of Lake Huron. A week at Camp Kintail cost \$500 or more, depending on the type of camp. To assist families who would find this too expensive, Kintail has what is called the "Campership" program. It works this way: Camp Kintail will pay 1/3 of the camp cost if Knox will pay 1/3 and this leaves 1/3 for the family to pay.

Knox Kids Camp

Knox Kids Camp is a day camp run here at Knox for seven weeks through July and August. The cost is \$175 per week. Even though our camp is half the price of others, it is still not affordable for some families.

PRESBYTERIAN CEMETERY, WOODSTOCK

It has been quite a while since the congregation has been updated on the happenings at the Presbyterian Cemetery located at 315 Vansittart Avenue and Vincent Street - Woodstock. It was established in 1857 and has been managed by dedicated Knox members ever since.

The cemetery consists of approximately seven acres and is divided into five sections. The Woodstock Baptist cemetery is joined to the north of us and consists of approximately 3 acres. We both share a

common cement block building which houses our lawn tractors and assorted equipment which is used to maintain the grounds.

On average it takes about 20 hours to cut our inside and outside grass and we do this about 10 times a year depending on the weather. We also trim the whole cemetery at least 3 times a year and to trim it all once takes us between 35 to 40 hours. We spend many hours doing spring and fall clean up with raking up pine cones and picking up tree limbs, filling in low spots, trimming bushes and fixing monuments when needed.

The cemetery is closed during the winter but we normally open up the cemetery gates at the end of April and close them again the end of November. Some exceptions apply depending on the weather and early or late burials.

The cemetery grounds are presently maintained by Don Stevens (19th year) and John Dobbs (5th year). Additional help is called in, when necessary, plus we do our own equipment maintenance unless major problems arise. Our two, 2018-year-old John Deere lawn tractors are still in good shape and we have access to the Baptist Ford tractor with bucket for help filling in graves.

Grace Poole and her late husband Don (2014) have been the care takers of the cemetery since 1985 (thirty-six years) and soon after they started Grace took on the responsibility of the Secretary - Treasurer's job which consisted of many activities such as: maintaining the cemetery records for plots sold and people buried, dealing with families, funeral homes and monument companies, dealing with paying the bills and looking after the financial statements and charitable receipts, etc. The job also included completing the annual paperwork for the Bereavement Authority of Ontario for our cemetery license, and dealing with the Trust company for our Care & Maintenance fund; plus, other things as they came up. Quite an achievement for

both of them and we are truly grateful for all they have done for the cemetery and for Knox Presbyterian Church.

Brad Markle has agreed to take over as Secretary-Treasurer for the Presbyterian Cemetery effective May 1st, 2022, and at the same time, we need to revive the Cemetery Board and hold a few meetings throughout the year to discuss issues and problems that arise.

The Board consists of the following people: Don Stevens, John Dobbs, Tom Yungblut, Bob Kern, and three new members Brad Markle, Mark Benner, and the Rev. Dr. Dong-Ha Kim.

All our records, forms and related paperwork have been recorded by hand and it seems necessary at this time to convert what we can to computer records for easier access and retrieval. Everything we do in our personnel life now seems to be done on-line and the cemetery needs to move in that direction.

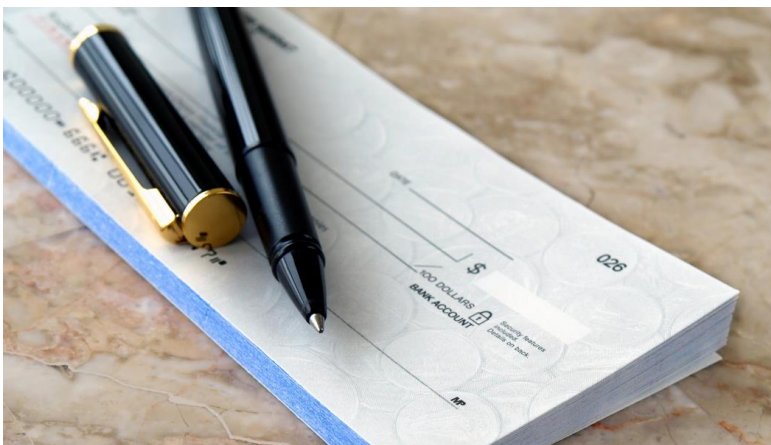
We have started by revising our Internment Rights Certificate and Cemetery Bylaws.

The cemetery's income, to pay our expenses, comes from these main sources:

- Care & Maintenance interest paid quarterly from our Trust fund account.
- Selling of plots-money left after 40% of C&M fees are paid to Trust Company.
- Opening and closing fees charged for burials or cremations.
- Charitable donations from families, etc.

Cemetery expenses that are covered are these:

- Wages paid for hours worked for clean-up, cutting grass, trimming, etc.
- Insurance cost
- BAO license and C&M Trust paid
- Supplies, equipment repair, gasoline costs
- Opening and closing of graves for burials



Due to lower income coming in these last few years and due to fewer plots being sold and less burials performed we are still breaking even with a small profit left over to start the next year.

BEGINNINGS BABY BOTTLE CAMPAIGN

Beginnings Family Services is a non-profit organization that assists young men and women in Oxford County facing unplanned pregnancies or parenting struggles by providing parenting or adoption support, while focusing on a child's need to have the best possible start in life.

The Beginnings Woodstock Care Centre provides:

- Pregnancy testing and counselling
- Parenting and family support programs
- Care cupboard
- Local governance, management, communication, administration



Programs offered are:

Teen Prenatal Classes – a prenatal group for teens; run in partnership with Oxford County Public Health.

Moms Group – weekly drop-in program for moms and children; every Tuesday afternoon (held here at Knox Church)

Fatherhood 101 – a free 4-week program designed for teen or young adult fathers or fathers-to-be.

Baby Brunch – free monthly breakfast program for parents with infants/toddlers; every 2nd Wednesday of the month.

Baby Smarts Program – Educational program designed for Grades 10-12 and for other youth organizations/youth groups.

Care Closet – free emergency baby supplies and maternity clothes.

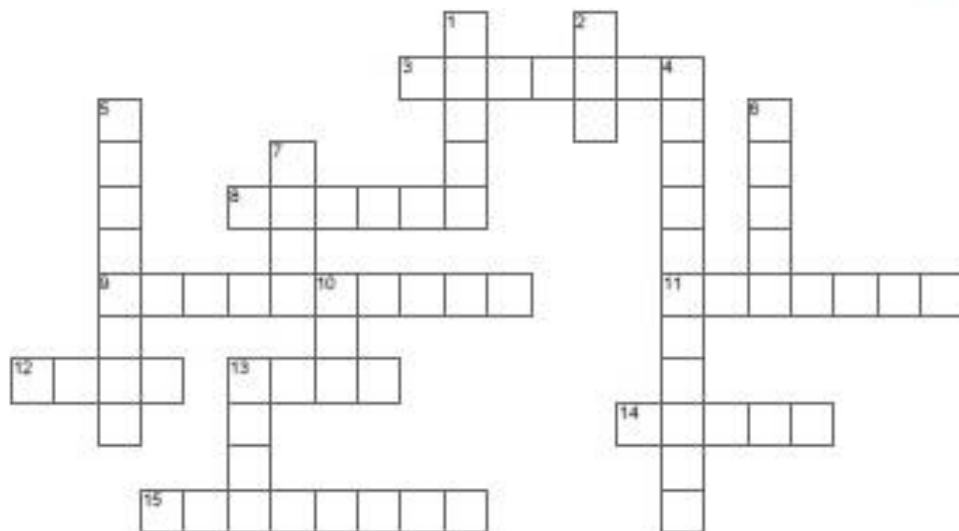
