

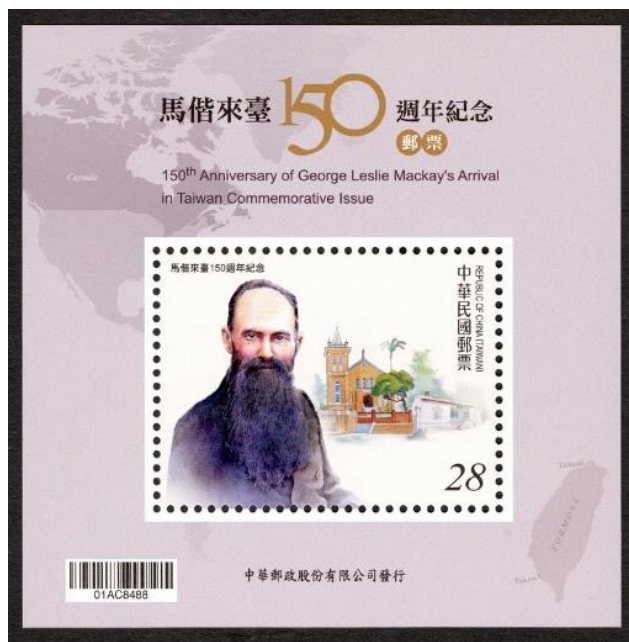

Speaking of which, I have had the good pleasure of being involved in an online symposium that honours George Mackay's mission work (June 23-24, 2022). Entitled, "Crossing the Bridge Mackay Built: 150 years of Canada in East Asia and East Asia in Canada," three entities collaborated to host this gathering of people and ideas to discuss, critique, and celebrate the importance of Mackay's founding work of foreign missions in the early days of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. In short, this symposium examined 150 years of *crossing the bridge Mackay built*, from Minnie Mackay's amazing life to Canadian sister city exchanges with Japan, a virtual tour of unseen artifacts from the Royal Ontario Museum, to engaging the playwright of the Embro musical about Mackay over a two-day gathering.

In the end, after much has been presented and discussed, this symposium bestowed upon the participants a sense of appreciation on how the *bridge of serving others in Christ's name continues to inspire this generation of Christians today, and beyond*.

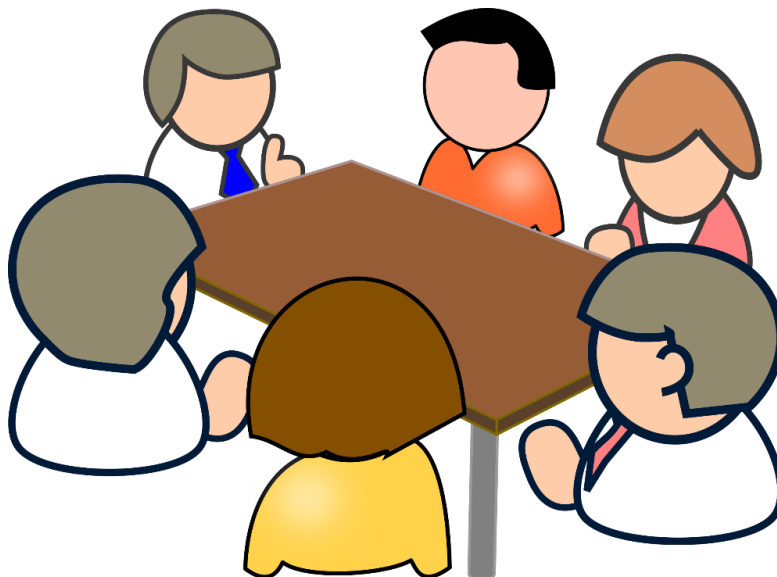
Suffice to say, it has been a humbling experience of co-organizing this event in service to the Presbyterian Church in Canada. The fact that I spoke also as the minister of Knox Presbyterian Church, Woodstock, Oxford County, contextualized this event ever so meaningfully.

Churches in Oxford County first and generously supported George Leslie Mackay's mission work in Taiwan 150 years ago. This symposium was a strong testimony of the continuing commitment of churches to support ministry locally and abroad.

I pray the Lord will continue to bless this congregation with a willing heart to be His instrument of peace and the Good News throughout our community and beyond.

**Christian Education Committee** - Knox Kids' Summer camp will continue this summer. There still is room for more campers.



The Prayer Shawl committee has knitted some afghans for our graduating teens.

**Leading With Care** – The fire drill was successful on May 29, although there are a few items to address. A seminar is planned on October 1 at 10 am about the problem of bullying, with other churches invited. First aid training will be planned in the spring of 2023. The stewards were asked to install highly visible numbers at each exit door, potentially useful by emergency responders.

**Covid-19** – The committee reduced the number of roped-off pews. Masking will continue for now, but we anticipate further loosening of restrictions.

**Trustees** – Disbursement of funds, as discussed in the May congregational meeting, has started.

Rev. Kim noted his one-year anniversary since preaching for a call to Knox will be in July.

**Next Meeting: Tuesday, Sept 6, 2022 @ 7pm**

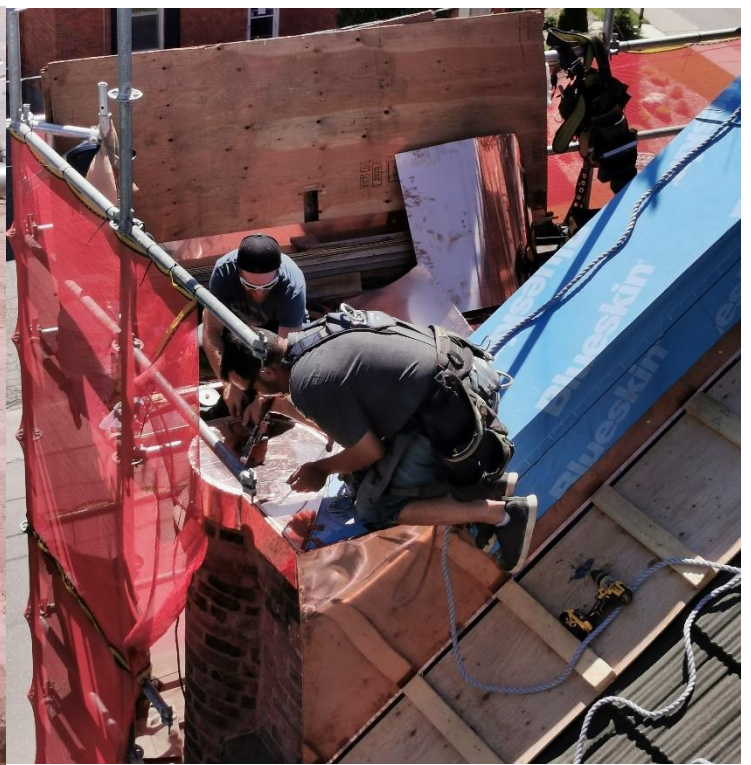
## RESTORATION UPDATES

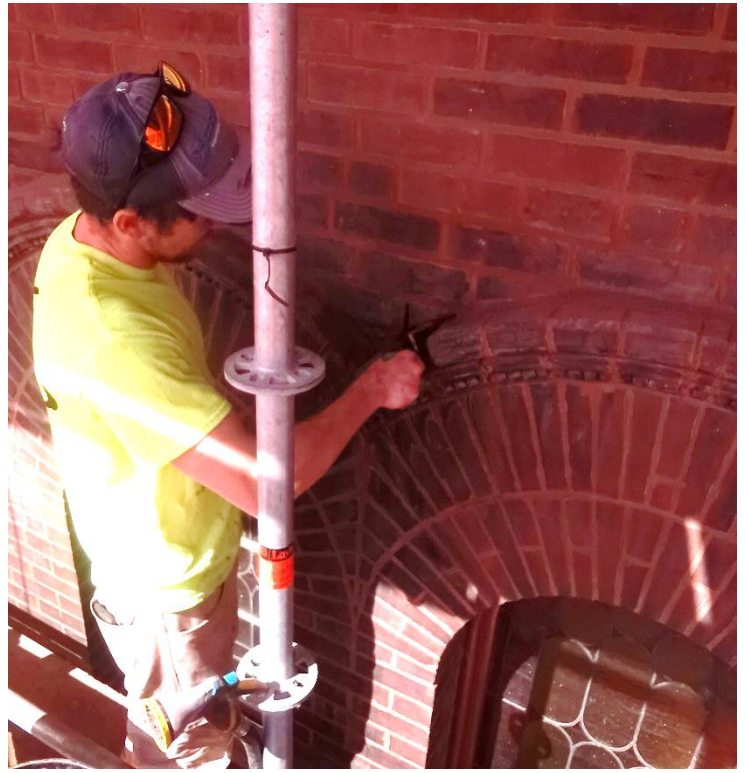

Anne MacKenzie and Tina Szasz volunteered their time to be our photographers. They took numerous photos during the whole event and were available to take pictures of anyone who wished one of themselves or their friends.



Norma Howe gave the lunch courtesies and invited Paris Presbyterian members to Embro for the *Fall Rally on Saturday, October 22, 2022*. The life and mission of George Leslie Mackay will be celebrated. This year is the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary since George Leslie Mackay left Embro for Formosa (Taiwan) as a Presbyterian missionary. Anne and Al Matheson will talk and show pictures from their trip to Taiwan.

Marybel Brenneman and Deb Melnyx had planned the Boxed Lunch Auction and they now presented prizes for the best finery—best floral flock, most elegant outfit, most springlike hat, cool cultural outfits and the most interesting accessory.

Deb Melnyx thanked our outgoing president, Judy MacIntosh, for her leadership and encouragement as Paris Presbyterian president since 2018. Previously, Judy filled the role of Paris Presbyterian treasurer for 15 years (2002 – 2017).

Judy was presented with a WMS Life Membership pin in appreciation for her dedication to Paris Presbyterian and the WMS.

It had been a fun day for all. We sang “Go Now in Peace” and Shirley Miller closed with prayer.



### Ukraine Crisis: Irina's Story



When the fighting in Ukraine started, Irina's family was torn apart. Her husband, a history teacher, joined the territorial defense force in the first days of the conflict. Irina and her two children sought refuge at her parents' house. However, she knew it was unsafe because the house lacked a basement, and bombs were starting to explode nearby.

*"During the first days [of the war], we tried to tell the children it was thunder. But when the active bombing started and the missiles fell near the house, the children started screaming [and] didn't want to leave the shelter [of furniture], so they ate there, they went to the toilet there. They were really very, very scared. That is why I realized that there was no time to wait, and it was time to evacuate somewhere," shares Irina.*

Sadly, Irina's parents did not want to leave, but Irina was determined to find a safer place for her children. Upon heading to the evacuation point, Russian forces started shelling the settlement. Irina was fortunate to see a convoy of cars passing by, and she decided to join them without knowing where they were going because she didn't have the time to think about it.

The family spent five days in the village the convoy had brought them to, then had to leave there as the war was catching up with them. Eventually, they were able to catch a train to western L'viv—the train journey lasted 20 hours and then another exhausting five-hour train ride to arrive at Batiovo, Transcarpathia.

Irina and her kids found safety at a refugee centre supported by Hungarian Interchurch Aid (HIA) through the ACT Alliance. In the shelter, Irina lives with 90 other refugees. The community shelter volunteers are doing what they can to allow life to continue as normally as possible. Since the war has forced elementary schools to switch to distance learning, Irina's daughter takes all her third-grade classes online. Her son will start school in the fall.

## PWS&D Responds

Families like Irina's are receiving cash assistance and emergency mental health and psychosocial support. ACT Alliance member Hungarian Interchurch Aid is assisting 14,000 households. In addition, PWS&D is helping provide emergency food assistance and other essential non-food aid, including hygiene kits and medical supplies, to thousands more people.

PWS&D, in partnership with Canadian Foodgrains Bank member Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA), will be implementing a response beginning this summer. This response, implemented in Ukraine, Moldova and Romania, will provide cash assistance enabling families to purchase essential items. Priority will be given to the most vulnerable households, including female and single-headed households, children at risk, gender-based violence survivors, and others.

### Chalmers Stained Glass Project Update

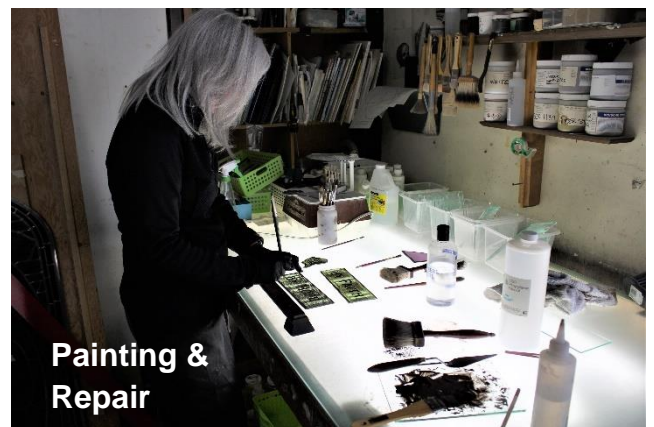
We have continued with the restoration of the stained glass obtained from the former Chalmers United Church on Vansittart Avenue.

“The Healer” window was given to Chalmers by John (Jack) Dunlop in 1961 and was placed in memory of Jack’s wife, Sara Fulton. It is in excellent condition and is ready to be mounted.

The “Mary of Bethany” window, originally dedicated in 1948, was a gift from J. Gordon Archibald in memory of his wife Elizabeth Ann Smelt. It needed considerable repair and has just been brought back to Knox from Sunrise Stained Glass in London. The photos below show the 4 stages of restoration – 1) the rubbing, 2) the painting and repair of glass pieces, 3) rebuilding with lead and 4) soldering the lead joints.

The next step will be to have metal frames constructed and then mounted with wooden frames in the interior of Knox.

We are fortunate to have these historical works of art and craftsmanship.

### Apple-Butter Barbecued Roasted Chicken



#### Ingredients

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1 roasting chicken (6 to 7 pounds)
- 1 can (11-1/2 ounces) unsweetened apple juice
- 1/2 cup apple butter
- 1/4 cup barbecue sauce

#### Directions

1. Combine the salt, garlic powder, pepper and cayenne; sprinkle over chicken.
2. Prepare grill for indirect heat, using a drip pan. Pour half of the apple juice into another container and save for another use. With a can opener, poke additional holes in the top of the can. Holding the chicken with legs pointed down, lower chicken over the can so it fills the body cavity. Place chicken on grill rack over drip pan.
3. Grill, covered, over indirect medium heat for 1-1/2 to 2 hours or until a thermometer reads 180°. Combine apple butter and barbecue sauce; baste chicken occasionally during the last 30 minutes. Remove chicken from grill; cover and let stand for 10 minutes. Remove chicken from can before carving.

### Small Batch Stovetop Apple Butter



#### Ingredients

- 1 1/2 pounds assorted apples (about 5 medium apples), cored and coarsely chopped\*
- 1/2 cup filtered water or apple cider (NOT vinegar)
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice (from 1 large lemon)
- 1/4 to 1/2 cup packed light brown sugar, to taste
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- pinch ground cloves
- pinch sea salt

#### Directions

1. Place apple pieces and cores in a large saucepan along with water, granulated sugar and lemon juice. Bring to a simmer over medium-high heat, then reduce the heat to medium-low. Cover and cook apples for 20 to 25 minutes or until apples begin to soften and fall apart.
2. Remove from heat and discard cores. Run softened apples through a food mill, discarding any remaining solids or seeds. (Alternatively, if you don't have a food mill, blend softened apples in a food processor or using a hand blender until smooth.) You should have about 2 cups of apple puree.
3. Return puree to saucepan and set over medium-low heat. Add brown sugar to taste, along with spices and salt. Gently simmer, stirring regularly to avoid spattering, until apple butter is deep caramel in color and thick enough to hold its shape on a spoon.
4. Transfer to a jar or airtight container and keep refrigerated for up to 3 weeks.
