Musings from the Minister



I am reminded of a time when I once took refuge at the *Crieff Retreat* near Guelph. Admittedly, it was for a conference of some sort in the Presbyterian Church in Canada. As if the serene surrounding was not enough, there hung in the entrance way to the dining hall a framed poster of one of the writings of *Saint Francis of Assisi*.

Saint Francis of Assisi is a venerable Christian figure of antiquity; he was an Italian mystic and Catholic friar who founded the Franciscans. Long story short, Saint Francis of Assisi was inspired to lead a life of poverty as a respected preacher.

I will share a sampling of the writing in musings for this month. The writing begins with the following:

"Lord, make me an instrument of your peace...
Where there is hatred let me sow love...
Where there is injury, pardon...
...where there is doubt, faith...
Where there is despair, hope...
Where there is darkness, light...
And where there is sadness, joy..."

I am not well versed in the world that *Saint Francis of Assisi* ministered, but I suspect it was much like ours in many ways, 'not enough of key resources of life, like food and shelter,' more than enough opinions and judgments thrown around, and of course, the brutal reality of war in their midst.

Peace in our world seems a scarce commodity, as we speak. Tuning out the news of violent outbreaks throughout the world is really not an option these days; many of us are reminded of the brutal nature of 'wars' and other forms of violence through relentless coverage of the wars and inhumane acts of violence through our media, and even demonstrations in our streets.

Throughout all of this, and seemingly, Christians have remained reticent. This reticence, however, does not equate to ambivalence on our part. Rather, Christians are striving to 'help more, and judge less,' I believe. We are all too aware as to how spur of the moment comments

can be hurtful to individuals, or even destructive to the collective endeavor in seeking peace. Such comments are better left unsaid.

Our hearts are burning, however, as we pray to God, that we may become instruments of His peace on earth, sowing love through our endeavor to understand, fostering communities of acceptance, and witnessing to 'hope' that undergirds all of His teachings in Jesus Christ. My personal assurance, as a Christian and a minster of a congregation, comes from the fact that I am not alone in my pursuit of addressing and fostering an ethos of an accepting and supportive community in the Oxford County and beyond, to start.

Session Notes

The Session met on Tuesday, October 3. Eleven elders attended, including the moderator, Rev. Dr. Kim. The moderator led us in opening prayer and a reflection about presenting Jesus. (Matthew 8:18-22)

Updates: David Langille will be presented to the congregation for re-election as elder. The election will take place on November 5.

Visioning and Caring: We noted that there are children at church on Sunday, at the children's choir ministry on Tuesday evenings, and a growing number at Kaos on Fridays.

Ministry Reports:

Christian Education Committee – More volunteers are needed on Sunday mornings to help with nursery and Sunday school.

Mission – A basket will be placed at the after-church coffee hour to encourage donations to the Kids' Camp ministry. Bibles were purchased for the youth attending Kaos. The Raw Carrot group will be invited to do a presentation at a Sunday service. Knox will serve meals at the Adelaide Soup Bowl on December 8 and 11 and April 12 and 15.

Board of Stewards – After receiving funds from trustees, our bank balance is close to even. We plan to use a new Ontario grant to add more security cameras to the church exterior. Exterior lighting should be installed in the spring.

Pastoral Care – The Kitchen Crew will be taking care of the poinsettias for shut-ins. Communion will be provided to shut-ins at their homes.

Worship – Session discussed the arrangements for communion. Dedications will be moved from damaged hymnals to newer ones. The inter-generational anniversary service plans continue. The committee discussed the need to acknowledge that Knox was built on indigenous lands, how it would be done, and how often.

Presbytery/Synod Report – Following the recommendation of our session, the Rev. In Kee Kim was nominated by our Presbytery as a candidate for Moderator of General Assembly 2024. A nomination from a second Presbytery is necessary for his candidacy to be accepted.

Other Business – We accepted the membership transfer of Anna Fohkens. We also decided to restore the many plaques to the sanctuary walls.

Maple-Apple Upside-Down Cake

Maple syrup infuses both the apples and the cake, making the dessert taste like a stack of apple pancakes.

Yield: 12



Ingredients

1 cup pure maple syrup

3 Granny Smith apples—peeled, cored and cut into eighths

2 cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon salt

3 large eggs

3/4 cup buttermilk

1 tablespoon pure vanilla extract

1 1/2 sticks unsalted butter, softened

1 1/3 cups sugar

Crème fraîche, for serving

Directions

Step 1 - Preheat the oven to 350°. Butter and flour a 10-inch round cake pan. In a large saucepan, bring the maple syrup to a boil over high heat, then simmer over low heat until very thick and reduced to 3/4 cup, about 20 minutes. Pour the thickened syrup into the cake pan. Arrange the apples in the pan in 2 concentric circles, overlapping them slightly.

Step 2 - In a bowl, whisk the flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. In a glass measuring cup, whisk the eggs with the buttermilk and vanilla. In the bowl of a standing electric mixer fitted with the paddle, beat the butter and sugar at medium speed until fluffy, about 3 minutes. Beat in the dry and wet ingredients in 3 alternating batches until the batter is smooth; scrape down the side of the bowl.

Step 3 - Scrape the batter over the apples and spread it in an even layer. Bake the cake for 1 hour, until golden on top and a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. Let the cake cool on a rack for 45 minutes.

Step 4 - Place a plate on top of the cake and invert the cake onto the plate; tap lightly to release the cake. Remove the pan. Let the cake cool slightly, then cut into wedges and serve with crème fraîche.





(adapted from the book by Tim Sims/Dan Pegoda)


While I know that boredom in church is never an issue here at Knox, these "Things To Do When You're Bored in Church" are fun to read!


