Alternatively, Advent invites us to see how different our world is when seen through the eyes of God's love shown in Christ; moreover, just how different our world could be in all of its potential!



Ministry Reports:

Children's Choir Ministry – The Children's Choir continues with energy.

Pastoral Care – Delivery of poinsettias and Christmas cards to shut-ins is arranged. The committee sent \$125 for the *Presbyterian Connection*.

Board of Stewards – The perimeter lighting should be installed in the spring. Stained glass will be installed and a dedication will be planned in 2024. WCI continues to use the church for their drama program. The speaker system in the sanctuary will be modified with additional speakers. The snow removal contract is being negotiated. Our CIBC branch is scheduled to close in March and we will need to use the branch at Montclair and Norwich.

Roll Clerk – Anna Fohkens and her mother have transferred their membership to Knox

Ministers' Report – The Yuletide Bazaar and other community events are successful this year and growing in size. The Zoom Bible study continues. An in-person Bible study might be scheduled as well. A precis of the studies may be distributed more widely.

Other Business – For people wishing to use Kendall Cab to come to worship on Sundays, we will make information cards to carry and show to the Kendall driver.

Music Moment

Here are some inspiring words taken from an Advent choral anthem:

"Righteousness and peace shall come to all the world around;

violence shall fade away, and hope and joy abound.

The Lord shall come like gentle rain to water all the fields again;

as showers on the fresh mown grass, to water all the earth."



K. Lee Scott is the author of the lyrics of the anthem called "Like Gentle Rain".

Scott has emerged as one of America's foremost composers of music for the church during the past three decades. His hymns are found in eight hymnals including Voices United (The United Church of Canada). His 300 published compositions include anthems, hymns, works for solo voice, organ, brass, and major works including a Christmas cantata and a *Te Deum*.

One of my favourite Christmas carols is "Once in Royal David's City".

The words were written by Cecil Frances Alexander (1818-1895). A good mingling of the biblical story and Christian Theology, the text sets the nativity of Christ into a much larger framework- the history of salvation. Alexander's words enable us to look back and to look forward from this historic event.

The "W" in Christmas

Each December, I vowed to make Christmas a calm and peaceful experience. I had cut back on nonessential obligations - extensive card writing, endless baking, decorating, and even overspending. Yet still, I found myself exhausted, unable to appreciate the precious family moments, and of course, the true meaning of Christmas.

My son, Nicholas, was in kindergarten that year. It was an exciting season for a six-year-old. For weeks, he'd been memorizing songs for his school's "Winter Pageant." I didn't have the heart to tell him I'd be working the night of the production. Unwilling to miss his shining moment, I spoke with his teacher. She assured me there'd be a dress rehearsal the morning of the presentation. All parents unable to attend that evening were welcome to come then. Fortunately, Nicholas seemed happy with the compromise.

So, the morning of the dress rehearsal, I filed in ten minutes early, found a spot on the cafeteria floor and sat down. Around the room, I saw several other parents quietly scampering to their seats.

As I waited, the students were led into the room. Each class, accompanied by their teacher, sat cross-legged on the floor. Then, each group, one by one, rose to perform their song.

Because the public school system had long stopped referring to the holiday as "Christmas," I didn't expect anything other than fun, commercial entertainment songs of reindeer, Santa Claus, snowflakes and good cheer.

So, when my son's class rose to sing, "Christmas Love," I was slightly taken aback by its bold title. Nicholas was aglow, as were all of his classmates, adorned in fuzzy mittens, red sweaters, and bright snowcaps upon their heads.

Those in the front row- center stage - held up large letters, one by one, to spell out the title of the song. As the class would sing "C is for Christmas," a child would hold up the letter C. Then, "H is for Happy," and on and on, until each child holding up his portion had presented the complete message, "Christmas Love."

The performance was going smoothly, until suddenly, we noticed her; a small, quiet, girl in the front row holding the letter "M" upside down - totally unaware her letter "M" appeared as a "W".

The audience of 1st through 6th graders snickered at this little one's mistake. But she had no idea they were laughing at her, so she stood tall, proudly holding her "W". Although many teachers tried to shush the children, the laughter continued until the last letter was raised, and we all saw it together.

A hush came over the audience and eyes began to widen. In that instant, we understood the reason we were there, why we celebrated the holiday in the first place, why even in the chaos, there was a purpose for our festivities.

For when the last letter was held high, the message read loud and clear:

"CHRIST WAS LOVE"

And, I believe, He still is.

Amazed in His presence... .humbled by His love.

Recipe

Pretzel M&M Hugs

These Pretzel M&M Hugs are the perfect treats for Christmas gifts or parties. They only need 3 ingredients, they take no time at all to make, they look so pretty and festive and they're

dangerously delicious!

Servings: 70 pretzels

Prep 15 minutes

Cook 5 minutes

Chill 5 minutes

Ready in: 25 minutes

Ingredients

- 70 square pretzels
- 70 Hershey's Hugs chocolates (from nearly 1 full 12 oz package), unwrapped
- 70 Milk Chocolate M&M's , I used the red and green Christmas package

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 200F. Line a cookie sheet with parchment paper. Align pretzels on cookie sheet in a single layer then top each pretzel with one Hershey's Hug chocolate.
- 2. Bake in preheated oven for 4 5 minutes, until the chocolate is shiny and soft (but NOT melting, the chocolates should still hold their shape).
- 3. Remove from oven and carefully place one M&M in the center of each soft Hug and press down on M&M to spread the chocolate.
- 4. Place in freezer or refrigerator and allow to rest until chocolate has set, about 5 15 minutes. Store in an airtight container.



Thank you all for your patience and kindness as WCI fills our church with their friendly and lively students!








