Rev. Dr. Dong-Ha Kim

"Faith Thrives in Adversity"



Portrayed here is one of my favorite words, **Hope**.

Those of you who have been following me on Sunday worship services will know that I use this vocabulary quite frequently. Suffice to say, my messages tend to be guided by the principles of this word. And this stems from my conviction that Scripture as a whole is intended to be a message of **hope** for the people of God. No matter how bleak the Scripture passage may seem, the intention is to convey **hope** in some sense, however big or small.

One of the most inspiring Scripture passages comes from the *Book of Psalms*. At one point, the Psalmist writes, *"But as for me, I will always have hope; I will praise you more and more...Even when I am old and gray, do not forsake me, O God, till I declare your power to the next generation, your might to all who are to come."* (Psalms 71: 14-18). For me, this is none other than the Psalmist's witnessing of God's righteousness and faithfulness to us through the myriad of life-giving activities, **all the days** of his/her life! No, this is not an ideal portrayal of what 'life' typically entails. Rather, it is the Psalmist's unfiltered orientation to God throughout his/her life, no matter what obstacles lay ahead! It is the Psalmist's witness of God and God's works amid life in all that it entails, the good and the bad.

One could say that the Psalmist echoes Jesus' message on the sustaining care of God:

"But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all things will be given to you as well" (Matthew 6:33).

That is, persons who strive for the kingdom of God will face adversity, as surely the Psalmist did, but he/she trusts and teaches others to trust that God's grace is sufficient.

The Psalmist, our Lord Jesus, and countless other faithful throughout time, lived in constant trust and **hope**. The resulting life, therefore, was and is one of 'praise to God'! No, we are not praising God for the ailments/challenges that any one of us is facing today. We do so, because we do not believe words like 'praise,' 'celebration,' and 'hope' are limited to those who are prosperous and advantaged; rather, such vocabulary belongs to those who know at all times that in 'every circumstance' of life - including those times when we are struggling - that our lives belong to God, and our futures depend on God.


Friends, I never cease to be amazed and surprised how, time after time, Scripture conveys to us a message of **hope**. And I pray this bit of sharing was able to do just that, if only in the smallest of ways.

Session Notes

The Session met on Tuesday, February 27. Ten elders were present. The moderator, Rev. Dr. Kim, led a devotion from 1 Corinthians 6:17: God sees us through the prism of Jesus' sacrifice and we are accepted and unconditionally loved.

Updates:

- The church sign committee is established and will research options together.
- The photo directory project is continuing and a first draft will be made available in April for proofreading.

Visioning and Caring: Committees will write descriptions of their work for the Knox News, through the year, culminating with Session in December.

Ministry Reports:

Mission – KAOS attendance averages 12, with 17 registered. Kids' Camp is being organised for seven weeks in the summer. Many changes will be implemented to reduce costs. Knox will prepare lunch at the Adelaide Soup bowl on Monday and Friday, April 12 and 15.

Christian Education Committee – A picnic will be held after church, one Sunday in June.

Children's Choir Ministry – The program is continuing with high-energy children.

Pastoral Care – The committee continues to make visits and contacts to the growing list of shut-ins (currently 20). The prayer-link, prayer shawl group, and meditation groups continue to function with support from the congregation.

Board of Stewards – The committee presented the general budget in preparation for Session

to review and for the 2024 annual meeting. The kitchen crew is in the process of remodelling the Cheyne Room. In conjunction with this, the two basement pianos (not repairable) and many hymn books from 1972 (with mold) will be disposed of.

Worship – Phone-live-streaming has been prepaid for the next 1-2 years. We will be purchasing two new Christmas trees. Communion will be provided at Maundy Thursday and Easter Sunday. We will plan to dedicate the new stained glass at our 190th anniversary in the fall.

Presbytery Report – Many churches are operating without ministers and many changes are in process.

Ministers' Report – The Good Friday service will be held at Knox this year. As a missional church, our activities are informed by a desire to make our community a better place.

New Business – We will be establishing a hymnal library in the board room, using donated hymn books from Bob Miller's collection.

Introducing the Pastoral Care Committee



For the next few months, you will see each of the committees of Session introduced one by one in the Knox News. If you are curious, read on!

The Pastoral Care Committee has the responsibility to aid the Minister (or Pastor) in caring for the members and adherents of the church. “Pastoral”, meaning “like a shepherd”, refers to the idea from the New Testament that Jesus is the Good Shepherd, and he commands Peter (and the other disciples) to feed his sheep—that is the followers of Jesus. The members of this committee have the privilege of visiting people, either in person or by phone, email, or letter, especially when there is a particular need. We try to keep in regular touch with shut-ins, especially our elderly members of whom there is an increasing number. The committee recognizes that there are many of you who also provide informal pastoral care as you stay connected with other people in our congregation, whether regular attenders or not.

The committee also oversees the activities of the Prayer Link, the Prayer Shawl Group, and the Meditation Groups. The Prayer Link is a group of members who are called upon particularly to pray for special needs in the congregation. They hold all information given in strictest confidence, of course. (If you have a concern you'd like prayer for, feel free to contact Rev. Kim, the church office, or any member of the committee.) The Prayer Shawl Group meets approximately once a month to make prayer shawls and pray together, but we work individually also, to keep up our stash of prayer shawls and afghans (which go to high school graduates). The meditation groups meet on Mondays in the Cheyne Room at 10:30 a.m. or on Zoom at 7:30 p.m.

The Pastoral Care Committee is responsible for the assignment of the end-of-the-month coffee hours, and we are actually going to be serving you at coffee hour on Easter Sunday, March 31! So come out and see who we are.

We always welcome people who are interested in getting involved, either by joining the committee itself or with the visiting aspect, the Prayer Link, the Prayer Shawl group, or a Meditation group. 

Starting soon, materials that we have removed from the library to make space for new items will be available in the Friendship Centre for free to anyone who wants them. Enjoy!







Paris Presbyterial WMS Annual Meeting

The WMS (Women's Missionary Society) in Paris Presbyterial celebrated their 139th birthday on Saturday, February 3, 2024. The annual meeting was held at the Paris Community Church with WMS members attending from Woodstock, Embro, Simcoe and Paris.

Greetings were given by Shirley Miller, presbyterial president, Deb Kallendar Stimphil from Council executive, Judy MacIntosh, Synodical president and from Michelle Benjamin from the Paris church.

Marybel Brennenaman led a thoughtful worship and memorial service. The offering of \$249.00 goes to the Action Refugies Montreal project. The money is used to buy telephone cards for refugees arriving in Montreal. Our guest speaker, Deb Kalendar Stimphil, shared PWS&D news about mission work and told us about her trip to Malawi. After lunch, the Rev. Mark McLennan and Susan McLennan led us in sing-song.

Following lunch and business there were some special presentations. Mark and Susan McLennan are retiring to Nova Scotia in June. They will both be missed for their presence and their musical gifts at our presbyterials. Rev. Mark had served three years as presbyterial president and Susan had been on Council. Mark and Susan were presented with a monetary gift that we asked to be used for landscaping their new home in Nova Scotia.

Presentations were also made to Shirley Miller, as outgoing president and Elaine Stevens as outgoing secretary. Shirley has served as presbyterial president three different times over the many years. Elaine Stevens served as presbyterial secretary for 19 years.

Recipe

Easter Bunny Treats

TOTAL TIME: Prep/Total Time: 15 min.

YIELD: 1 dozen



Ingredients

- 1/3 cup vanilla frosting
- 36 miniature marshmallows
- 36 large marshmallows
- Red and pink heart-shaped decorating sprinkles
- Small black nonpareils
- White jimmies
- Pink colored sugar

Directions

1. Place frosting in piping bag. For each bunny, cut 2 miniature marshmallows in half and use frosting to attach them to 1 large marshmallow to form arms and legs.
2. For the face, attach 2 miniature marshmallow halves for cheeks. Use the heart-shaped sprinkles, black nonpareils and white jimmies to form nose, whiskers and eyes.
3. For the ears, cut 1 large marshmallow in half diagonally. Dip each sticky side in colored sugar and use frosting to attach the ears to the top of the large marshmallow. Use frosting to connect the 2 large marshmallows; let stand until dry.






