


Minister's Musings

"ONE WHO FOSTERS..."

As a reader, I like to read the 'Introductions' that one sometimes finds in a book. To that effect, I have been fortunate to have come across some rather interesting writings under this genre.

I feel inclined to share with you one such writing, or rather a sample, composed by "Maurice Stanley Friedman." Friedman was an interdisciplinary, interreligious philosopher of dialogue, and a prolific writer. His writings include, of course, some of the most memorable 'Introductions' to a book authored by another.

One 'Introduction' which Friedman composed is entitled, "A True Teacher." Friedman writes,

"The true teacher is not the one who pours information into the student's head as through a funnel... or the one who regards all potentialities as already existing within the student and needing only to be pumped up... It is the one who fosters genuine mutual contact and mutual trust, who experiences the other side of the relationship, and who helps his pupils realize, through the selection of the effective world, what it can mean to be a person."

Some of you may have been so fortunate as to have come across such a 'teacher'; for the whole lot of us, this sounds like a wish-list of a teacher we would want.

Scripture reminds us that we do, as a matter of fact, have with us such a 'teacher,' our Lord Jesus Christ who has taught and continues to teach in our midst through the Holy Spirit. The Letter to Philippians (2:5-8) reminds us that,

"Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death – even death on a cross."

Jesus lived and taught amongst the people, even those who were considered undesirable by the community standards. He mingled with them, ate with them, laughed and cried with them in the deepest of their sorrow!

Jesus used clear and understandable language, soul piercing stories, and examples from everyday life. His lessons included many common experiences that ordinary people would have experienced, and thus could understand. How many of us have longed for our loved ones to return, that we may rejoice over their return regardless of where they have been, or what they had done?

Jesus demonstrated that nothing was beneath the Son of God; not even the humiliation and pain of the crucifixion. And through his resolute and willing choice to face the cross, Jesus showed the world that choices for God and eternal life can be made.

'Yes,' we have a great teacher on our side; for the Bible tells us so.

Ministry Reports:


- **Christian Education** A new convenor is needed for this committee. The committee selected June 2 for the Sunday School picnic.
- Children's Choir Continues to meet. The children sing occasionally at Sunday services.
- Leading With Care A surprise fire drill will be held at a Sunday service this spring.
- **Mission** We will have a mission (Kids' Camp) focus on Sunday, May 19 when some of the camp staff will attend.

- Board of Stewards The new stained-glass installations have been noticed with positive comments.
- Restoration Committee Brickwork will continue this year, from June to August. The south wall and the Friendship Centre will be the focus this year, with a budget of \$170,000. No doorways will be closed off this year because of the restoration work.
- Worship We are going to improve lighting in the two alcoves the children's area and the mission board. More people listened to our Sunday services using Phone-livestreaming in March.
- **Presbytery/Synod Report** Rev. Kim will attend General Assembly, but plans to be in church on June 2. David Langille agreed to do pulpit supply on June 9.
- Ministers' Report Kids' Camp and the children's music ministry have been supported by the church, but they may need an evaluation to discern how to proceed. Rev. Angus Sutherland, who is a numismatics enthusiast, is investigating the production of a souvenir coin to celebrate 190 years of Presbyterian presence in Woodstock.

New Business

- Cheyne Room renovation is scheduled for completion at the end of April.
- Dr. Ernest van Eck, the principal of Knox College, has agreed to speak at our 190-year anniversary celebration on November 3.
- A proposal to spend the remaining funds in the Karen refugee support fund will be addressed at the May meeting.

F ACE - facial numbness or weakness especially on one side.

A RM - arm numbness or weakness especially on one side.

S PEECH- abnormal speech, difficulty speaking or understanding others.

TIME - is important, call EMS/9-1-1 immediately and get an AED.

Our Leading With Care Team strives to keep all in our Knox Family as safe as possible. We have numbered both the interior and exterior doors which helps us to evacuate Knox during fire drills. If there is a real emergency, we will be better prepared to get emergency help into our building faster.

We are planning a fire drill in the upcoming weeks. We will activate the fire alarm. Please read the accompanying material to be well prepared!


We regularly re-stock our 5 first aid kits. Do you know where they are located? Have you looked for our fire extinguishers? If you were asked to get the AED kit, would you know it is found in the hall way behind the choir loft?

Last fall we had several staff and volunteers take the Red Cross first aid training. Have you read the first aid tips each month in Knox News? Previously, our committee held a seminar on "Bullying" lead by David Phillips, Administrator of Leading With Care for the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

We advise church staff and volunteers when police safety checks are required and how to get them. In the fall, Mikayla will be running a training session in LWC for all workers in the nursery, Sunday School and Knox Kids Choir. "We will prevent abuse of children/youth/vulnerable adults. Prevention means having good processes in place in order to prevent opportunities for abuse, neglect and harm from arising." (Leading With Care Manual, Page 6)

Recipe

Boterkoek (Dutch Butter Cake)

This delicious Dutch boterkoek (butter cake) is moist with an intense almond flavor. It's a favorite in many Dutch households!

Prep Time: 20 mins Cook Time: 30 mins Total Time: 50 mins Servings: 16 Yield: 2 8-inch cakes

Ingredients

- 2 large eggs
- 2 ½ cups all-purpose flour (can also use
- 2 ½ cups gluten-free flour)
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 ½ cups white sugar
- 1 cup butter, softened
- 1 tablespoon almond extract
- 2 tablespoons thinly sliced almonds (Optional)



Directions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease two 8-inch round cake pans.
- 2. Whisk eggs in a small bowl; reserve about 1 tablespoon for brushing over dough. Whisk flour and baking powder together in another bowl.
- 3. Beat sugar and butter in a large bowl with an electric mixer until light and fluffy. Mix in beaten eggs, then stir in almond extract. Stir in flour mixture by hand using a sturdy spoon; dough will be stiff.
- 4. Press 1/2 of the dough into each prepared pan. Press almond slices into dough, then brush reserved egg over top.
- 5. Bake in the preheated oven until the top is golden brown, about 30 minutes. Let cool, then cut into wedges to serve.
