### **FASTING: TO BE CONTINUED**



One of the most common rituals observed by Christians during the Season of Lent is 'Fasting.' That is, we endeavor to espouse abstinence from food, or other forms of indulgences for the purpose of devotion and spiritual discipline during Lent.

While *fasting* is not a biblical requirement, one of the central reasons to *fast* is to remind ourselves that we are dependent on God alone. Every time our stomach rumbles, it ought to remind us that we are not self-sufficient but we are dependent on God who gives our "daily bread" (Matthew 6:11).

Admirable examples of *fasting*, however, are plenty in Scripture. For instance, when Jesus was being tempted in the desert, He *fasted* in order to focus Himself on prayer and preparing for His mission ahead (Matthew 4:1-2).

In a similar manner, immediately following his dramatic conversion on the road to Damascus, Paul *fasted* as he prayed and tried to understand what he had seen and what Christ was calling him to do (Acts 9:8-9).

While indeed *fasting* is not a biblical requirement, many Christians, nonetheless, engage themselves in purposeful abstinence out of their desire to focus on God's will for them, especially during the Season of Lent.

What has been explained thus far about *fasting* is quite 'traditional', and 'common.' Scripture, however, has always called upon the faithful to explore beyond the 'traditional' and 'common' in order that they may learn to focus on God's will ever so meaningfully in their time. For me, that nudge to explore something new came from *Hilda Nichols*, a member of Knox Presbyterian Church, and a *pen pal* friend of mine. She had recently come across a beautiful poetry on '*Fasting*.' Prudent that she was, Hilda maintained a copy of this poetry; on recent occasion, she felt it was appropriate to share with me. Granted, this may have been in the Knox News at some point; I am grateful to have received a copy. And I think neither Hilda nor the original author would mind if I shared it with you.

#### 'FASTING'

Fast from hurting words – Say kind words.

Fast from sadness – Be filled with gratitude.

Fast from anger – Be filled with patience.

Fast from pessimism – Be filled with hope.

Fast from worries – Have trust in God.

Fast from complaints – Contemplate simplicity.

Fast from pressures – Be prayerful.

Fast from bitterness - Fill your heart with joy.

Fast from selfishness – Be compassionate to others.

Fast from grudges - Be reconciled.

Fast from words - Be silent so you can listen.

While *fasting* may not be a biblical requirement, it sure sounds like something that our Lord Jesus exemplified throughout his life, and now encourages his faithful to follow.

The following background information about the famous hymn "Blest Be the Tie that Binds" is interesting to be sure. (words written by John Fawcett)

The drama of this famous hymn centers around a loving congregation, a woman who spoke her mind, and a Baptist minister who refused a call to one of the largest churches in England.

In the summer of 1772, the Rev. John Fawcett, whose family had "increased faster than our income" was overjoyed with the receiving of a "call" to the famous Carter's Lane Baptist Church in London.

Immediately, preparations were made to transfer to this greater opportunity. A great loyalty and devotion had developed between Pastor and People, and although they gave their time and strength willingly to help him pack, they did not hide their reluctance about letting him go.

When the final day of moving came, the wagons arrived early and loading of boxes and bundles began. Finally, only one box remained, in the middle of the dining room. Rev. Fawcett saw that his wife stood near it in deep thought. "What's the matter?" he asked. Her reply was slow and thoughtful. "Do you think we are doing the right thing?" she asked, "Where will we find a congregation with more love and help than this?" The minster was silent a moment, then he replied, "I think that you are right, dear. I have acted too hastily. I was so overjoyed to think that I would have a better home and a larger salary for you and the children that I did not really pray about it." Together they walked to the porch and explained to their people that they had decided to remain.

Drop the card in the small silver box next to the Return Materials box on the small wooden table and enjoy what you have signed out!


If an item does not have a borrower card, that means it is not to be taken out of the library so that it's available for use at any time.

# Dump Cake Recipe

A blast from the past, this easy Dump Cake recipe only takes 4 ingredients. Switch up the filling ingredients depending on what you have on hand or what your favorite flavor is. A scoop of ice cream on top takes it to another level!

#### Ingredients

- · 1 can (21 oz) cherry pie filling
- 1 can (15 to 20 oz) crushed pineapple\*
- 15.25 oz box packaged yellow cake mix
- · 1 cup butter

#### Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 325°F. Spray a 9x13-inch baking dish with nonstick cooking spray.
- 2. Spread the pie filling in the bottom of the baking dish.
- 3. Evenly pour the pineapple over the top of the cherry pie filling.
- 4. Sprinkle the dry cake mix over the pineapple.
- 5. Melt 1/2 cup of the butter and pour evenly over the top of the cake mix.
- Take the remaining 1/2 cup of butter and cut into small pieces. Place the pieces of butter over the top of the cake.
- Bake the cake in the preheated oven until the top is golden brown and the filling is bubbling around the edges, about 40 minutes.
- 8. Serve the cake warm with ice cream, if desired.

#### Notes

Large cans of pineapple range anywhere from 15 oz to 20 oz. Any size within this range will work.

Some of the stations within the Knox centre include:


- Using the Psalms as Prayer there are comfortable chairs for reading the Psalms, or writing your own.

TIPS FROM THE CANADIAN RED CROSS- Tip #6

Strain and Sprain Treatment for Mild Cases

Treat the injury using the RICE method -

**R** est: Have the person rest comfortably.

I mmobilize: Keep the injured area as still as possible.

**C** ool: Cool the injured area for 20 minutes of every hour.

**E** levate: Raise the injury, as long as this does not increase the pain

For more serious injury, seek medical assistance.




