ALL THAT I NEEDED TO KNOW



Year end for our 'little ones' at school will be arriving, soon. For those having graduated from the *Kinder Garten* level of education, it will have been quite the new experience.

In any case, our newest grads from *Kinder Garten* will have been taught some of the most important, foundational lessons in life! Such foundational lessons have left such a mark on one educator, 'Robert Fulghum,' that he summarized them in a delightful book entitled, "*All I Really Need to Know, I Learned in Kindergarten.*" Shall I share some reminders from those lessons?

Fulghum writes, "*All I really need to know about how to live and what to do and how to be I learned in kindergarten. Wisdom was not at the top of the graduate-school mountain, but there in the sandpile at Sunday School. These are the things I learned:*

Share everything.

Play fair.

Don't hit people.

Put things back where you found them.

Clean up your own mess.

Don't take things that aren't yours.

Say you're sorry when you hurt somebody.

Wash your hands before you eat.

Flush...

When you go out into the world, watch out for traffic, hold hands, and stick together...

Goldfish and hamsters and white mice and even the little seeds in the Styrofoam cup – they all die. So do we..."

Where we are in life today, you will no doubt agree that we have many complicated problems on our hands. Our initial inclination is to presume complex causality behind

them. After reading a bit of Fulghum's kindergarten lessons, I'm not so sure. Many of our challenges/problems emanate from the foundations on life that we were likely taught early on in our lives; we've failed to carry them throughout our adult years.

Once upon a time during Jesus' ministry, a lone expert of the laws, a Pharisee, approached Jesus for his perspective on "*the greatest commandment in the Law*" (Matthew 22:35). Whatever his motive may have been, Jesus replied with the following, foundational response for this Pharisee:

" 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and the greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." (Matthew 22:37-40)

If anything, these two foundational teachings should remind us of the Sunday School lessons we once received; certainly, this ought to be the foundational lessons that our young members receive during Sunday School classes, first and foremost. And now that our Sunday School classes are wrapping up for the season, we pray that the foundational lessons they will have learned will carry them throughout their growing years and beyond.

Just as we may delight in the reminder statements from the likes of Robert Fulghum, I pray that the words of Jesus will stay with us all the days of our lives. If only humanity could remember to *love God with all of God's wisdom, and also to love one another as ourselves...* And so, we shall continue to meet, praise God, pray for God's grace to open our hearts and minds to discern such foundational lessons for each of us.

Jesus never promised that our lives would be clear of the obstacles to navigate through; he did promise his unending presence in journeying with us, as we meditate upon these foundational words of wisdom.

May it be also that we may proclaim, *'All that we ever needed to know, we learned from Jesus' teachings.'*



Session Notes

The Session met on Tuesday, May 7. Thirteen elders were present. The moderator, Rev. Dr. Kim, led a devotion regarding fasting, physical denial of food and spiritual fasting. (Matt 4:1,2 & Acts 9:8,9).

As a follow-up from the April session meeting, the decision was made to release all the funds to the Karen family and close the account. The funds will be directed to post-secondary education.

The membership transfer of Kyoungmi Kim was approved.

Visioning and Caring:

We have introduced a small form, available at the sanctuary entrances, which newcomers can fill in to provide contact information.

Ministry Reports:

Christian Education – Lots of activity in the CE committee, although it needs more committee members and especially a convenor. The committee is considering making a child-friendly section of the sanctuary. Sunday school is averaging 5 children per Sunday. [After the session met, the CE committee met and decided to cancel Kids' Camp this year.]

Children's Choir - The project is successful with children and drawing in some new people to church, but future funding is a concern.

Leading With Care – A fire drill was held during the May 5 Sunday service, taking 2 minutes and 8 seconds to vacate the building. The committee will examine some improvements. The steward committee is tasked with developing instructions for concert organisers.

Mission – The committee continues to look for a camp director. The congregation was given a chance to meet the camp staff at the May 19 service. Thanks to those who helped with the Adelaide Soup Bowl. They are looking for new people to continue. We will be fundraising using baby-bottles for pregnancy support services.

Board of Stewards – David Langille is the new convenor. The stained-glass cabinets in the Friendship Centre are completed, and there have been many positive comments. New outside lighting will be installed this spring. The personnel committee will be hiring a nursery worker with the Christian Education committee. Cheyne Room renovation is complete, and new furniture is on order.

Restoration Committee – Work will start at the beginning of June and will be completed in September.

Worship – There has been an increased use of Phone-live-streaming each month.

Presbytery/Synod Report – Several churches continue to search for ministers. Central-Brantford will move to a new location. Tillsonburg is selling their manse. Norwich/Bookton is amalgamating. Innerkip continues their process of leaving the PCC. Ingersoll is hosting 2 Syrian families. Dr. Kim is attending General Assembly.

Ministers' Report:

David Langille has agreed to look after the Sunday worship on June 9th in Dr. Kim's absence.

Anniversary Events:

Dr. Ernest van Eck, the principal of Knox College, agreed to speak on November 3rd in celebration of our 190th anniversary. We agreed to commission an anniversary “coin” in the shape of a communion token (rectangular, 2” x 1.5”) in collaboration with the Woodstock Coin Club (Rev. Angus Sutherland, president). We will purchase 100 “coins” at a price of USD1,000 (C\$1,400) to resell at C\$15.

At our anniversary celebration, we will dedicate the stained glass in the Friendship Centre.

Dr. Kim will take holidays, requiring pulpit supply on July 28, August 4, August 11, November 10 and November 17, 2024. Members of the congregation will be asked to provide pulpit supply.

New Business:

The Robinson Fund for cab fares and other benevolent needs has a low balance and will run out in a few months. Once the Robinson Fund is depleted, it will be closed and the Benevolent Fund will be used in future.

At the end of Q1 in 2024, Knox investment in the PCC Portfolio increased from \$968,183 to \$1,039,536. This welcome gain of \$71,353 equates to 7.37% for the quarter or 29.56% annualized.

A few weeks ago, the Chancel Choir sang an anthem called "All Things New". Here is some background about the American composer Elaine Hagenburg.

She was born in Washington State, in 1979. Elaine's music "soars with eloquence and ingenuity". Her award-winning compositions are performed worldwide and frequently featured at American Choral Directors Association conferences, All-state festivals, Carnegie Hall, and other international concert halls from Australia to South America and throughout Europe.

In addition to composing full-time, Elaine actively engages in bringing her music to life as the guest artist and featured clinician for professional conferences and festivals both in the US and abroad.

She is also the devoted mother to four children.

The text of the beautiful anthem was written by Frances Havergal (1836- 1879), who also wrote the words of the hymns "Take My Life and Let it Be" and "Like a River Glorious", among many others.

Loralee Benner enjoyed learning the anthem's accompaniment and played it with great musical precision. As you well know, she is a very accomplished musician and I am grateful to work alongside her!

I am very pleased to let you know that Jessica Moir (pianist) and Bronwyn Soward (vocalist), each received a scholarship this year. The Bob Miller Memorial Hymnbook Collection



For those who knew him, my dad - Bob Miller - was many things. First and foremost, though, he was a lifelong musician. He was a pianist and church organist starting when he was still in high school and he had only stopped playing in the last few years. Not only did he teach music throughout his career in the public school system, but he directed choirs of all ages and sang in several ensembles as well. He was often called on to play for funerals and to accompany groups at Presbyterian Music Camp. We lost someone who cared deeply about music when he died a year ago November. He shared his gifts at Knox as our organist and choir director for many years, and more recently with helping to organize the Community Carol Concert.

Over his career, Bob amassed a large number of hymnbooks. As a legacy to his love of church music, to encourage sacred music and singing and as a resource to current music directors in local churches and beyond, Josie (my mom) and I want to make his collection available. Session has endorsed this idea. In June, the Bob Miller Memorial Hymnbook Collection will become a reality. Church musicians will be able to come and borrow hymnbooks that they perhaps don't have budget to buy, or to just enjoy paging through hymnals rather than merely looking online. The collection will be stored in a labeled cupboard in the Board Room.

Dad always loved making a joyful noise, whether by singing or playing rhythm instruments or recorders or the piano or organ. Music was always important to him, so we hope that this resource collection will carry on his love for church music and praising God together.

Thanks again to everyone who uses the library and who has donated resources to us. If you've been in lately, you will have seen some of the newly catalogued picture books displayed. We have some beautiful, new, fun books to read! There are also many new paperback picture books. We are gradually working through the backlog of donations since 2019 and making great headway!

This month we're highlighting two sections of our library that are specifically for parents and families:

We have a new "Parent Shelf" section with books to read with your children (or grandchildren) to help with tough topics or struggles they may be having. Until now, these were kept with the paperback picture books, but we decided to separate them out so that they are easier to find. If your child is struggling with any issue (or they have a friend who is) please make use of these books. Many have suggestions in the back for talking through the issue beyond what is included in the story. We have books on coping with the death of a pet or family member, bullies, bad dreams, screen time, vandalism, lying, talking back, homework, separation and divorce, worry, fear, school, conflict and more. If your child or a friend are experiencing it, we probably have a book about it. For now, these are on the stained, narrow dark brown bookshelves in a magazine holder for the larger books and a sky-blue plastic index card box for the smaller books.

We also have part of a shelf in our Spirituality section (dark green dots) specifically for Families. These resources are in the left large bookcase on a lower shelf on the side closest to the window. Here you'll find books with encouragement for parents, family devotions, activities to do together as a family, advice on parenting issues, dealing with different ages and stages, and helping to nurture faith in your children, among other topics. As we get closer to summer, when more time will be spent together as families once school is out, hopefully some of these resources will come in handy to make family time fun and inspiring and maybe even healing with a celebration of our faith thrown in. Don't forget to borrow some books from the children's section, too, for bedtime or car trips or reading in a hammock or on the deck.

Families are important at Knox, and we all know that it takes a village to raise a child. Our prayer is that parents won't feel alone but instead will find lots of support through their

larger family of faith and through the resources we have in the library. Please sign them out or take a break in your busy day to just come in and have a breather and read. These materials are here for you to inspire and encourage and hopefully make the journey just a little bit easier. God is with you in your calling as a parent or caregiver to children in your life.

TIPS FROM THE CANADIAN RED CROSS - Tip #8

Tick Bites




Care

If the tick hasn't started to dig into the flesh, brush it off the skin.

If the tick has begun to bite:

1. Use tweezers to grasp the tick by the head as close to the person's skin as possible.
2. Pull upward without twisting until the tick releases its hold. If you cannot remove the tick or if its mouthparts stay in the skin, the person should seek medical attention.
3. If the tick is removed, wash the area with clean water.
4. If the area becomes infected or the person develops a fever or rash, the person should seek medical attention.



Save any tick you remove in a sealable bag or empty pill bottle, and bring it to the medical appointment. Ticks can be tested for diseases such as Lyme disease and so can help to diagnose your condition.

Strawberry Shortcake



Ingredients:

4 cups flour

2 tbsp baking powder

1 tsp soda

1 cup sugar

1 tsp salt

1 cup shortening

2 cups buttermilk (or sour milk)

Mix dry ingredients and the shortening until the mixture is crumbly. Add buttermilk and mix just enough to make sure the dry part is moistened. Spread dough into 9 x 13 pan.

Sprinkle white sugar on top. Bake in 400F oven for 20 minutes or a bit longer. Serve warm, smothered with sugared berries or sliced peaches. For ½ recipe, bake in 9 x 9 pan.

Lyca Mhone: Woman with a Calling



Lyca has been my friend since I met her in the fall of 2019 in Blantyre, Malawi. She has been a part of Friends of Prisons, a small group of people who make it their business as volunteers to visit the inmates in many different prisons, in the southern part of Malawi. When I first met them, they had already been active for several years, and continue to go strong, gathering more members periodically as other people hear the call of God to this ministry.

Back in 2022, Lyca felt God showing her the need for another ordained minister to be part of the group to minister more fully to the inmates. She heard God's

call to herself to get the qualifications for ordination, and being obedient to the call, started the process of getting the education she needed. When she shared with Steve and me her need for financial help with the incidental expenses associated with attending Zomba Theological University, a two-hour bus ride away from her home, Steve and I searched for ways of supporting her. We asked Session and got their permission to support Lyca through our church's Bursary Fund, which has been set aside for supporting people who are studying for the ministry.

Our church committed to supporting Lyca in this way for the three years of her studies. And now the time has come when, reaching the end of her second year, she is ready to start her third and final year of studies. I know that Lyca truly appreciates the support from our congregation. It has enabled her to continue her studies without having to worry unduly about whether to eat or to take the bus to attend classes, whether to buy notebooks or to pay for necessary overnight accommodations. She also appreciates our prayer support, as she believes very strongly that God has called her to this ministry.

If you feel so led, the Bursary Fund can always use an infusion of dollars, in order that people can continue to pursue the call of God to the ministry. 


