## **Session Notes**

The Session met on Tuesday, June 11. Twelve elders were present. The moderator, Rev. Dr. Dong-Ha Kim, led a devotion regarding serving & connecting (Luke 10:38-42).

As a follow-up from the last meeting, plans to celebrate the 190<sup>th</sup> anniversary were discussed.

<u>Correspondence:</u> The PWS&D 2023 Impact report is available to share.

#### **Ministry Reports:**

**Christian Education** –This year it has proved impossible to convene Kids' Camp. The committee has started considering how Knox will continue with Christian Education without Kids' Camp.

**Children's Choir** - The project is successful with children and the children have been singing at Sunday Services. Future funding will need to be addressed.

**Leading With Care** – There is new exit signage in the Friendship Centre.

**Mission** – Lyca Mahone has been accepted by the Blantyre Synod to be ordained as chaplain for Friends of Prisons, once her education is finished. She will need Kw 1,200,000 (C\$950) for the next six months. Session agreed to pay this as well as \$1400 for a new computer, which is needed for Lyca's continuing studies.

**Board of Stewards** – New outside lighting is progressing [completed in late June]. The personnel committee is developing a job description for a nursery worker, with input from CE and Leading with Care committees. The annual statistical report is completed and approved by the PCC office.

**Restoration Committee** – Work will start in July and will be completed in October. **Worship** – The committee discussed the May communion, phone live streaming usage, and the welcome and greeters' cards. They also discussed the upcoming November Anniversary and October Reformation Day services.

**Ministers' Report –** Dr. Kim went on a Study Leave – "The Father Heart of God". Dr. Kim also attended General Assembly (June 3-6) this year as Paris Presbytery representative. Two major items this year were the budget (large deficits) and the church's relationship with indigenous church leaders.

Here are some interesting facts about the composer G. P. Telemann (1681-1767). He was a German Baroque composer and multi- instrumentalist. Telemann is one of the most prolific composers in history, at least in terms of surviving works. (His name is listed in the Guinness World Book of Records because of his record-breaking amount of music composed!)

Telemann was considered by his contemporaries to be one of the leading German composers of the time and he was compared favorably to his friend Johann Sebastien Bach, who made Telemann the godfather and namesake of his son Carl Philipp Emanuel, and to George Frederic Handel, whom Telemann also knew personally.

Much sacred music was composed by him, including 1700 church cantatas, 17 masses, and 6 oratorios.

Welcome to the Knox Stewards Committee








Mikayla Voortman, our Youth and Christian Education Director, Lauren Reczuch, Courtney Soward and Marg McCurdy.



#### **Knox Phlox Garden Guild**

A couple of gardeners were reminiscing about the beginnings of the *Knox Phlox* group and our church gardens. May of our current church members might not be aware of how or when the group started.

In 2009, the small beds in front of the church and at the corner were in very rough shape. Plants were



overgrown and the beds were full of weeds. A call went out to the congregation – workers were needed and so were plants!

A little history note: **A Guild**, also spelled gild, was an association of craftsmen formed for mutual aid and protection and for the furtherance of their professional interests. **Guilds** flourished in Europe between the 11th and 16th centuries and formed an important part of the economic and social fabric in that era. We wanted a more fun name than just "Garden Guild" although we honour the meaning behind the term Guild. We decided on Knox Phlox Garden Guild as our group name.

A surprising number of people showed up on the designated Saturday morning and work began.

As often happens with people who love to garden (!) the gardens expanded over time and additional gardens were created. The majority of our perennial plants were donated by members of the congregation – for example, all the rudbeckia (brown-eyed Susan) came primarily from Joan Willsie and Janet vanderSpek; the hostas came from many people; the iris were reclaimed from along the edges of the church building; the large ornamental grass came from Kevin Rumble. The Solomon's Seal plant came from Rob and Rev. Anne Blane.

In the garden along the north edge of the parking lot (bordering the neighbor) there is an ornamental Pear tree. This tree was planted to honour Margaret Douglas when she retired as the congregational Parish Nurse. The euonymus shrubs in this garden came from Evelyn

O'Leary. If you look closely in this bed there are some decorative rocks which were donated by the Rock Hound group.

The lilac trees were rescued from a neighbor by Nathaniel Bonnett; the Eastern Redbud was planted as a tiny sapling by Susan McLennan.

In past years the youth group has, on occasion, worked with some of the Knox Phlox members to clean up the property on Earth Day and then enjoy snacks and fellowship together, with the snacks being provided by Knox Phlox.

When Knox Kids Camp was running, the children planted flowers (with the leadership of a couple of Knox Phlox gardeners) in the front bed facing WCI the first week of camp. They always enjoyed that activity!

In 2021, the group volunteered to help our neighbors at the United Way (in the old manse) and 'adopted' their garden as part of our outreach.

Typically, the group gathers in spring and fall to work together and divides into teams over the summer months to keep the gardens weeded and watered if needed.

We would love to have extra gardeners participate. Many hands make light work! One of our members recently moved, so we welcome and encourage you to join the Knox Phlox Garden Guild.

I hope this gives you some appreciation for the gardens around the church and perhaps encourage you to walk around the property and look at the



gardens surrounding our beautiful building.

# **Woodstock Wonders Ride Yet Again!**

Steve McInnis and I are Knox's team for the PWS&D Journey for Hope on September 28, 2024. We will be biking between 25 and 30 km that day or thereabouts (depending on weather) to raise money for the Food Security programs of PWS&D around the world. this year is \$3000 as a team. Every little bit counts! So far, we've already raised about \$150, a reasonable start, but we have a long way to go to reach our goal.

Last November, I actually visited several projects of Canadian Foodgrains Bank aimed at improving food security. One of them was in partnership with PWS&D; it was a cash distribution project to tide over farmers whose crops in 2023 had been destroyed by Cyclone Freddie. The farmers were also given eggplant and tomato seedlings to help with food security in the meantime. Mrs. Mpamba, my hostess for the overnight stay in the village, was one of the recipients of this cash and plant distribution. I actually helped her water the eggplants the morning I was there! She was grateful for the support she has gotten, and prayed that her crops would be abundant this year so she could be independent again as she had been in the past.

It was very special for me to see firsthand the devastation caused by such a natural disaster and meet someone personally who was so deserving of our aid. I would encourage you to contribute whatever you can, so that people like Mrs. Mpamba can have enough nutritious food to thrive. For those who always wondered what to do with their National Geographics, they will gladly take them. The magazines are used for teaching purposes in poorer countries.



# Gluten-Free Recipe - Teriyaki Beef and Broccoli

**Ingredients:** 

Medium-Sized Rice Noodles
Beef Strips
Olive Oil
Canola Oil
¾ cup cooking onion, chopped
Can mushrooms
Celery stalks

**Gluten-free Soy Sauce** 



Gluten-free Beef Broth

1 large carrot

2 cups broccoli pieces
Garlic powder to taste
Salt & Pepper to taste

½ bottle Gluten-free Teriyaki Sauce

2 medium sliced peppers

Place a large Dutch oven of water on high on the stove until it comes to a full boil, then turn the heat down while continuing to boil the water. Add as many rice noodles as you would like to make. Boil for several minutes until the noodles taste close to done.

While starting the water to heat for the noodles, brown strips of beef in a frying pan with a bit of olive oil. Remove from pan, discard oil and wipe with paper towel.

Add two or three tablespoons of canola oil to the pan to brown the ¾ cup chopped cooking onion.

Add a can of drained mushrooms and sauté until slightly browned.

Add sliced celery two stalks, 2 tbsp soy sauce, and 1 cup beef broth and cook on medium heat.

Add one large sliced carrot. Place the lid on the pan and allow the carrots to steam. Cut broccoli into bite sized pieces (2 cups) and add to the mixture when carrots look close to cooked.

Sprinkle with garlic powder to your taste, salt and pepper to taste, add a quarter of a bottle of teriyaki sauce.

Add the cooked beef strips back to the pan and two medium sized sliced peppers to the pan and cover.

Add more Teriyaki sauce to the mixture to keep a sauce on bottom of the pan. Add cooked rice noodles to the pan and fold together the noodles and vegetables with sauce.






