

We await a new anti-hate grant from the Ontario government to finance the upgrade more exterior doors. There are four panels of stained glass from Chalmers United still needing work. The congregation will be asked to donate to pay for this. The elevator has not been working and repairs were projected to be expensive and take a long time. However, shortly after the session meeting, the elevator was repaired without expensive parts. An upgrade is still recommended by the service company.

Shalom! God's peace!


















Knox Presbyterian Church History

Presbyterian Church (Woodstock, Ont.) was organized in 1838 by the Rev. Alexander Gale as a part of the Church of Scotland. The first minister was the Rev. Daniel Allen who served the joint charge of Woodstock and Stratford until 1840 when he chose to serve Stratford alone. A church building was finished in 1842 and named St. Andrew's. During the Disruption, St. Andrew's remained with the Church of Scotland and a majority of the congregation chose to join the Free Church. A new church building was completed in 1850 and named Knox. The first minister of Knox the Free Church congregation, was the Rev. William Servos Ball. St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church united with Knox Church in 1865. A new church building was finished in 1897. Knox Presbyterian Church chose to remain with The Presbyterian Church in Canada during the time of Church Union in 1925.

59 Riddell St. Knox Church 1897 Presbyterianism in Woodstock dates back to 1834. In that year a small congregation held services in private homes and a schoolhouse. A church site was granted on Graham Street in 1837 and work began in 1841 with White and Lewis as the contractors after much fundraising. Knox Church was first built on Perry Street in 1849 and after many renovations to that site to accommodate a growing congregation, the present church you see today on Hunter and Riddell Streets was built in 1897. When the 1925 union of Congregational, Methodist, and Presbyterian churches formed the United Church of Canada, most of Woodstock's Presbyterians decided to maintain their identity rather than join the union.

Historical Sketch Knox Presbyterian Church (Woodstock, Ont.) was organized in 1838 by the Rev. Alexander Gale as a part of the Church of Scotland. The first minister was the Rev. A new church building was finished in 1897. Knox Presbyterian Church chose to remain with The Presbyterian Church in Canada during the time of Church Union in 1925.

Knox Church Historical Highlights

Knox Church has a rich history that traces back to 1839, when worship services were held at the Goodwin School House located at Dundas and Bay Street. In 1841, the congregation moved to a white frame building known as St. Andrew's Presbyterian, situated where Woodstock Hydro is now located. By 1849, Knox Presbyterian Church was established at the northwest corner of Perry Street and Elgin Street, a site that served the community until 1897 and was built for \$4,850. The same year, a bell was cast by the Meneely Bell Company of Troy, New York, and began ringing in 1853, serving not only as a church bell but also as a town fire bell and a signal for evening curfew.

In addition to its worship facilities, Knox Church played a vital role in community life. In 1849, a 4-acre plot on Vansittart Avenue for a Presbyterian Cemetery was granted by Lord Elgin. Between 1852 and 1929, the Gaelic Free Presbyterian Church operated. It was later renamed Chalmers in 1875 and moved to Vansittart in 1929. The first church is the badminton club today. By 1856, the church recognized the need for expansion due to increasing attendance and added a gallery in 1857. The congregation also invested in a permanent manse in 1861, purchasing a residence formerly belonging to D.S. McQueen, opposite the church.


The musical heritage of Knox Church was marked by the installation of a new organ built by D.W. Karn and Co. in 1877 or 1878, costing \$3,350. This organ was later rebuilt and enlarged by the Woodstock Pipe Organ Company in 1927. The late 19th century saw the construction of the County Court House from 1890 to 1893, further cementing the area as a community hub. Since 1896, Knox Presbyterian Church has been located at the northwest corner of Hunter and Riddell Streets, continuing its legacy in the Woodstock community.

Knox Church, designed by the architects Messrs. Burke and Horwood of Toronto, was constructed in the 1890s at a cost of \$46,000. The interior features pews and pulpits crafted by the Globe Furniture Company of Walkerville, with the original organ and bell relocated from the former Knox Church on Perry Street. Architecturally, it showcases Richardsonian Romanesque style, characterized by its robust structure and aesthetic details, and is a twin of the slightly larger Metropolitan United in London, Ontario. The main auditorium's nave measures 67 feet square, arranged in a gentle arc for optimal acoustics and sightlines. Two small transepts are each 8 feet deep and 37 feet wide. The impressive 108-foot main bell tower symbolizes the Presbyterian Church's beliefs in strength and solidarity.

Originally, the church was designed to accommodate 1,400 worshippers, although current seating is under 1,000. The sanctuary boasts a remarkable collared ceiling, supported by

specially designed cantilever trusses, ensuring unobstructed views. Knox Church features 150 windows, 27 of which are adorned with stained glass. Six large chandeliers, crafted by the American Copper Company of Toronto at a cost of \$845, illuminate the sanctuary. The building's high-quality brickwork includes lintels and sills made of red sandstone, which are currently being restored to their original color after years of being painted.

The church's history includes notable renovations, such as the transition from gas to electric lighting in 1914 and significant updates to the chancel in 2005, which included the addition of a lift for better accessibility. The Sabbath School area is a polygonal rotunda, which follows the Akron plan of church school architecture and features clerestory windows that flood the space with natural light. The main room of the half is 38 feet in height. Symbolically, the Alpha and Omega medallions, symbolizing the beginning and the end, each encircled by four bats, enhance the church's spiritual narrative. A ninth bat is found hovering above the door upon which Christ is knocking – the Scott dedicated stained glass window just inside the north west door. The chandelier is not original to Knox and added in 1999 from the Dereham Centre Wesleyan Methodist (later United) Church 1892-1972.



Knox Church officially transitioned from its previous location on Perry Street with its last service on September 5, 1897, before holding its first service at the new site on Hunter and Riddell just a week later. The total timeline from the decision to build to completion was just 18 months, reflecting the community's dedication to establishing this cornerstone of worship.

The first manse for Knox Church was established in 1861 on Perry Street, serving the congregation until 1914, when a new manse was built on Hunter Street, which remained in use until 1982. Additionally, in 1926, the church made modifications to the choir entrance, removing the steps from the sides of the chancel that led to the balcony, streamlining access to the choir area.

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Growing up at Knox

Knox will always hold a special place in my heart. I was baptized here as an infant in the mid-1970s and, being the organist's daughter for much of my growing up years, I spent a lot of time at the church. So many things were happening — Brownies, Girl Guides and Pathfinders, Beavers, Cubs and Scouts, and COC (Children of the Church) and Explorers (thank you Gwen Brown and others for leading). Sunday School was in the basement with Grace Poole at the piano in the Cheyne Room. There was two weeks of morning VBS in the summer with nearly every room used for something. Potlucks

filled the dining hall with people as eager kids raced to the front of the line to get a coveted piece of KFC from the bucket. Church picnics were over at Victoria Park if the weather was nice, with the all-important candy and peanut tosses as well as the water balloons among other games.

Those of us in the junior choir wore our cotton gowns each week in worship — white for the younger ones with blue collars and blue with white collars for the older ones. Joan Willsie and others showed us much patience as we learned anthems and the second verse of the children's hymn to sing by ourselves in the service in the old choir loft with the pulpit high above us. We performed the cantata 100% Chance of Rain complete with vibrantly coloured umbrellas in the Lecture Hall (now the Friendship Centre). It was packed in there for the Christmas pageant, with beige curtains rigged up across the front of the stage and entrances and exits from the sides and use of the balcony above. Rows of chairs for overflow of attendees were placed upstairs around the railing. Every class got to participate and then we enjoyed a feast afterwards downstairs.

When the 150th anniversary was celebrated in 1984, every group was asked to create a banner and they hung all around the Friendship Centre. In the 1980s big projects were under-taken, like adding the outdoor ramp and removing all the pews in the sanctuary to carpet the entire main floor. We worshiped at WCI for a month at least while this work was done and the Lecture Hall was stacked high with pews. Various rooms were updated and used for different activities. What is now the Spirituality Centre has been the ladies' parlour, choir room, youth room and an office. Carpeting the Lecture Hall covered up the discing lanes. There had been so many discers that both the Dining Hall and the space right above it were needed to accommodate all the teams. I never witnessed it in action and can't imagine how noisy that was!

When I was old enough, senior Sunday school was held before church and youth group met regularly. We baked and delivered cookies and visited shut-ins as well as playing baseball and other activities. The CGIT met in the basement where the new washrooms are now and put on a candlelight late evening service each Christmas Eve in their navy and white uniforms. I remember Lottie Sutherland and Marg Douglas' faithful leadership of this group. Music and the choir were always important and at the heart of worship and the many concerts hosted. There were also several units of the Ladies' Aid meeting on different days at different times, and the WMS was flourishing. The bazaar was on a Wednesday with a full dinner served. Once I was in high school, I ran across the street from WCI at lunch to buy baked goods and Christmas gifts.

When I went away to university and then seminary, Knox was always an anchor and my spiritual home. There was no question for me that Knox was the ideal place to host the training and first week of the Summer Experience program in 1999 and 2000, a Synod-wide traveling VBS team of high school youth. I will always be grateful for the hospitality and warm welcome shown to everyone involved in this ministry, and for setting the tone for all the places we went after those first weeks together. Whether it's hosting concerts or dinners or programs or even whole congregations - as we did after the tornado in 1979 destroyed Maranatha Church and they had to rebuild - Knox has a history of stepping up to help out wherever we can.

In spite of challenges and changes, Knox has continued to be faithful, attempting to serve Christ in new ways and to be a welcoming place where the Word of God is preached and people find hope and love. The Spirit has enabled us to keep serving those who are part of our family and the wider community. What the next chapter will be for us after years of church decline across our society and weathering Covid remains to be seen. What we do know, and can rely on, is God's faithfulness and good plans for us. Happy 190th Anniversary!

One of my memories is of the dumb waiter that connected the kitchen to a room off what is now the Friendship Centre. Bud and Isabell would put me in it and send me up—I guess that was the first elevator for food and little sisters!

Sunday school was a big part of my childhood. I remember Jeannie Linnell, who hosted fun class parties at her home. Some classmates were Shiela McAdam, Donna Ross, Sandra Osborne, and Gladys Clark. When we moved up to senior Sunday school, Miss Piper gave each of us a Bible, a tradition continued by Mr. Ken Pullin and Don and Grace Poole.



Mrs. T.L. Hay used to have Garden Tea Parties for the ladies of the church, and as teenage girls, we got to help serve at her beautiful estate.

Knox Young People's was another fun part of our church life. Every May 24 weekend, we went to Kintail camp to clean it up for summer campers. Those weekends were filled with laughter, especially when someone accidentally put their elbows on the dinner table! I remember names like Jim Brooks, Sheena Smith, Myrna Cousins, and my siblings Bud and Isabell.

George Armbrust was the choir leader. And I can't forget Junior Choir with Ruth Hodgins, where we wore white gowns and blue bows.

Thinking back on these memories fills me with gratitude for the community that shaped my childhood. Knox Church was more than just a place to worship; it was a family, a place of shared experiences, and a vital part of our lives. These memories remind us of the strong bonds we created, the lessons we learned, and the love that still connects us today.

Dessert Recipe



INGREDIENTS:

- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice plus more for sprinkling
- 3 tablespoons melted unsalted butter
- 1/3 cup chopped pecans
- 1 Granny Smith apple cut into 8 slices
- 18- ounce tube Pillsbury Crescent Rolls

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper.
- 2. Mix brown sugar and pumpkin pie spice in a small bowl.
- 3. Toss apple slices in butter.
- 4. Arrange crescent roll triangles on baking sheet and sprinkle brown sugar mix onto each triangle.
- 5. Sprinkle each triangle evenly with pecans.
- 6. Place an apple slice on the wide end of each triangle and wrap dough around each apple.
- 7. Brush each crescent roll with butter and dust with pumpkin pie spice.
- 8. Bake for 10 to 12 minutes at 375 degrees until golden.
- 9. Cool for 5 minutes before serving.
